



By virtue of her victories in the 1984 and 1985 British Open finals Susan is now undisputably the world's top woman, but she is determined to gain her first world title in Ireland. Susan is extremely fast around the court and has a brilliant array of attacking shots, whilst she is also able to play to, and maintain a tactical plan. Another of her classic attributes is to win when at times she seems below her peak. Her determination and temperament are such that she will lead New Zealand with total effort in the teams event as well as in the individual championships. Tennis and cooking are amongst her interests outside of squash.



DONNA GURRAN

From the Rumuera Club in Auckland, aged 22.

Current World Ranking: No. 21. Current N.Z. Ranking: No. 3.

Donna was a member of the N.Z. team at the 1983 World Championships and also competed as a junior in 1981 in Canada. She is a former N.Z. Under-19 and Under-23 National Champion. She has played in the last two European seasons achieving some significant victories. She has stroke making ability to dictate play, especially with her volleys and drops as well as having the potential to maintain her improvement. Donna includes amongst her interests hockey, horticulture and tennis.



IILLIAN OAKLEY

From the Henderson Club in Auckland but represents the Wellington District.

Current N.Z. Ranking: No. 4.

1985 N.Z. Under-23 Champion and a former N.Z. Junior titleholder. This year's World Championships will be Jillian's first appearance for her country but she has made rapid progress and her game should develop further with the training and preparation for Ireland. Although her play is based at present on her ability to rally and retrieve, her attacking shots will continue to become more accurate. She has the capacity to be a national representative for years. N.Z. Champion 1982 (N.Z. Open Champion 1983). National representative since 1979 including 1981 and 1983 World Championships. Former Chairman of the Women's International Squash Players Association.

Robyn has competed on the European circuit for many seasons and includes the 1983 Scottish Open amongst her successes. She wa ranked 3 in the world in 1983 and prior to the emergence of Susan Devoy was regarded as New Zealand's best ever women's player. She has an attractive range of strokes and is particularly strong on the backhand. While despite an apparent lack of urgencyf, her court coverage is excellent. She has the ability to rise to the occasion and will be determined to do her utmost to be a member of a successful national team. She includes amongst her interests gardening, reading, selective sports and pottery, and is a University graduate.

A physiotherapist by occupation, Susie Simcock has been the manager of the N.Z. team since 1980 including the 1981 and 1983. World Championships. Although a relative late comer to squash she has been ranked as high as ten in New Zealand and is still a formidable competitor.
