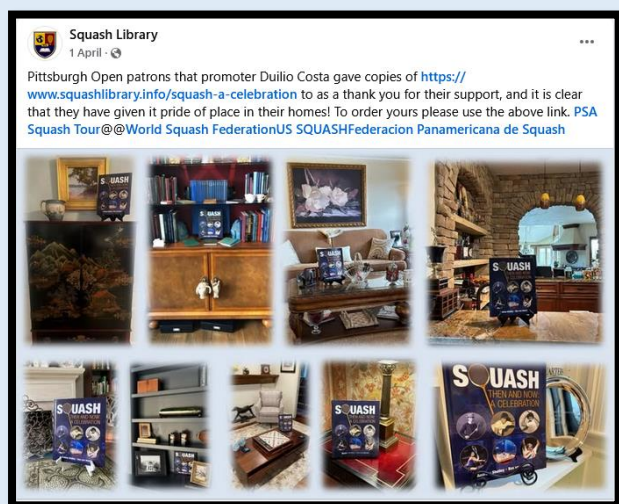

The first squash magazine in USA was Squash News, launched in April 1978 by husband & wife team Hazel & Tom Jones. Coming from an advertising / PR background, when hired by public club owners in New York to secure publicity for squash they started the publication. Initially it was primarily sold to New York public clubs, the Professional Hardball Association and U.S. regional squash associations.

As Hazel Jones commented, 'As a result of growing interest in squash, and the lack of a way to learn about what was happening on a more timely basis, we decided to start the publication, which was a very humble tabloid printed in one color'.

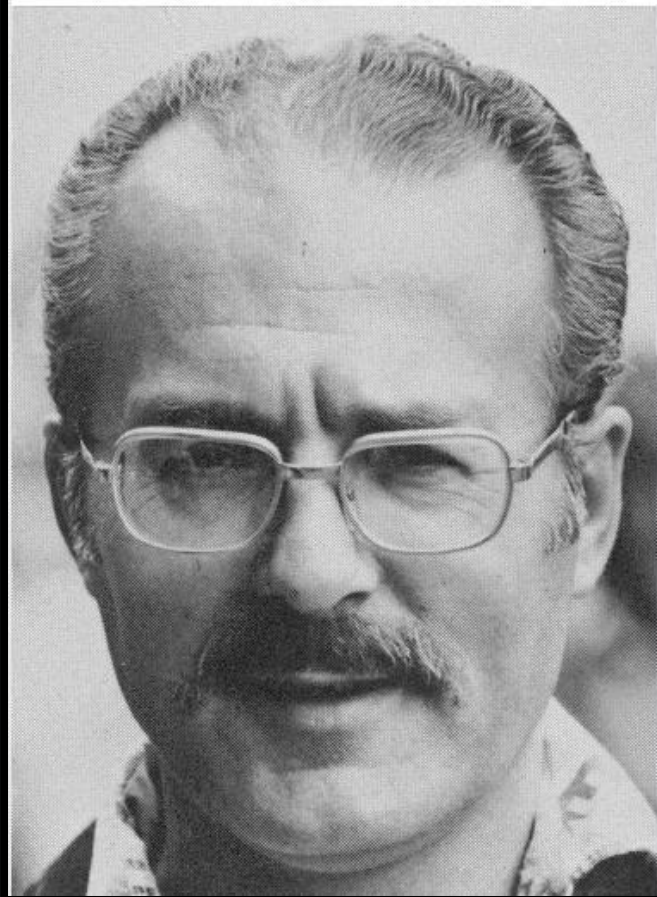
Within a year US Squash had linked in to make it their official magazine, with Squash News a membership benefit. It ran for 21 years, before the baton was taken up by Squash Magazine. Here are the first and last covers. [US SQUASH](#)



In the 1970s as glass backwalls increased the broadcast and spectator potential for squash events, media, led by newspapers, was expanding too. So much so that squash journalists in the UK & Ireland formed themselves into the Squash Writers' Club on 7 February 1975 - finals day of the British Open that year.

The SWC was chaired by celebrated Times newspaper writer Rex Bellamy (pic), and aimed to give promoters and sponsors guidance in helping the media and so garner greater coverage, while also indicating the facilities and general support press needed to be able to undertake their journalistic duties.

Media cost-cutting meant the number of specialist journalists dwindled and the club faded away during the 1980s. The World Squash Media Service by Howard Harding (in 1996) funded by WSF, PSA & WISPA ensured general servicing continued.



In June 1987 ISPA (became PSA in 1993) issued its first ISPA NEWS, re-named PROSCENE in 1989.

In the four pages, the large Men's Tour prize money increase was highlighted. From \$158,000 in 1983, by April 1987 it had broken the \$1m barrier at \$1,159,000. [Squash - PSA World Tour](#)

Goodbye Greg - and thanks!



GREG POLLOCK three years ago as the chairman of the ISPA, came to a close during the Association's annual meeting at the Radisson Hotel on March 30 when he formally announced that he would not be seeking re-election.

His decision to return to the family business in Australia and to return from professional squash had been known for some time.

Greg's straight talking, no-nonsense style, his appreciation of the business world and his dedication to improving the lot of his fellow squash professionals, earned him the respect of all who dealt with him and his business. Stuart Davenport of New Zealand is under no illusion that Greg will be "a hard act to follow".

It was Davenport who said before to Pollock's work for the Association and who on behalf of the membership presented the retiring chairman with a silver-plated silver in recognition of his outstanding services to the ISPA and to professional squash.

During his period of office Greg has seen the annual budget from 18 events in 1984 worth \$275,000 to this year when there are likely to be in excess of \$400,000 worth of events.

He has also played a major role in setting up the Men's International Squash Tournament Council, the 10-30 partnership between the ISPA and the IWSF, set up to develop the men's calendar worldwide and handle arrangements for the Grand Prix.

During the meeting he was awarded a further honour when membership approved his appointment as a Life Member of the Association.

In his closing speech, Greg reminded ISPA members that they still always intend their member of having a living.

He stressed "ISPA must be the controlling body for players. The Association must be responsible for player rankings and the scheduling of events. This function must be maintained at all costs."

He said there were people in the world who did not have the player's interests at heart and who would seek to undermine the

strength and credibility of the Association. "Be on the look out for these people, he warned "and be prepared to stick together."

ISPA's new chairman is 54-year-old Stuart Davenport, who moves into one of the most important and influential positions within the sport after a year as president.

He will be supported by Graham Bruns, who steps up to president from vice president, Cenny Jones, who is the new vice president, and

Jansher closes in after rankings shake-up

JANSHER KHAN, 17-year-old brother of former world No.1 Muhammad Khan and tipped as a future world champion, has jumped ten places to No.4 spot in the latest official world rankings issued by the International Squash Players Association.

Jansher's leap to the top echelon of the world's leading players, is one of a number of dramatic changes in view of the biggest ranking shake-up in recent years.

The young Pakistan, number one in the British Open, was only No.10 on the ranking list six months ago. But then he reached the final of the Squash Open in February and won the Pakistan Open de Paris event.

His surge has almost been matched by Chris Dinnar of Australia, who has climbed from No.10 to No.11 in February 1987 and now to his new spot of No.8.

Another Australian, Rodney Martin, who came within three points of beating No.1 Jansher Khan in the British Open, continues his rise and makes an impressive jump from No.12 to No.6.

Four players lose their top ten position - Ross Thomas and Katrina South of Australia, and Graham Bruns and Hady Jones of England. And Big England's tip over the last seven down ten stop there as Tim Kennedy and Oved Williams have also slipped.

Only the improvement shown by James Hickson, Steve Bennett and Cenny Madhogs helps offset the loss to English side.

Lower down the order, spectacular progress has been made by Adrian Davies of Wales (24 to 40), Satoru Ishii of Canada (35 to 40), Rodney Jones of Australia (35 to 40) and James Mansfield of England (55 to 60).

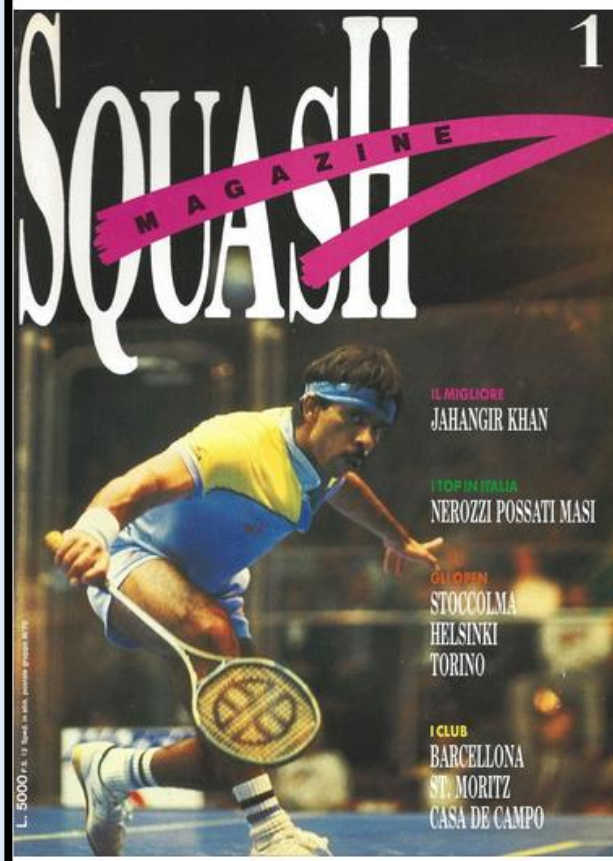
The 1986 first edition of Squash Mag, a French publication, had a double page article on a May '86 promotional week for the sport featuring a showcourt being built in the shadow of the Eiffel Tower with several days of exhibitions, squash marathons and event finals.

The first issue of a stylish Italian publication called Squash Magazine was published in March 1987 (pic). It had international as well as domestic news, with wording only in Italian. Two years later the Summer 1989 edition was the first with 'International' added to the title, with wording initially in both Italian & English, and worldwide distribution.

At the end of 1992 it became an English language only glossy magazine, before finishing publication with the Winter 1996 edition.



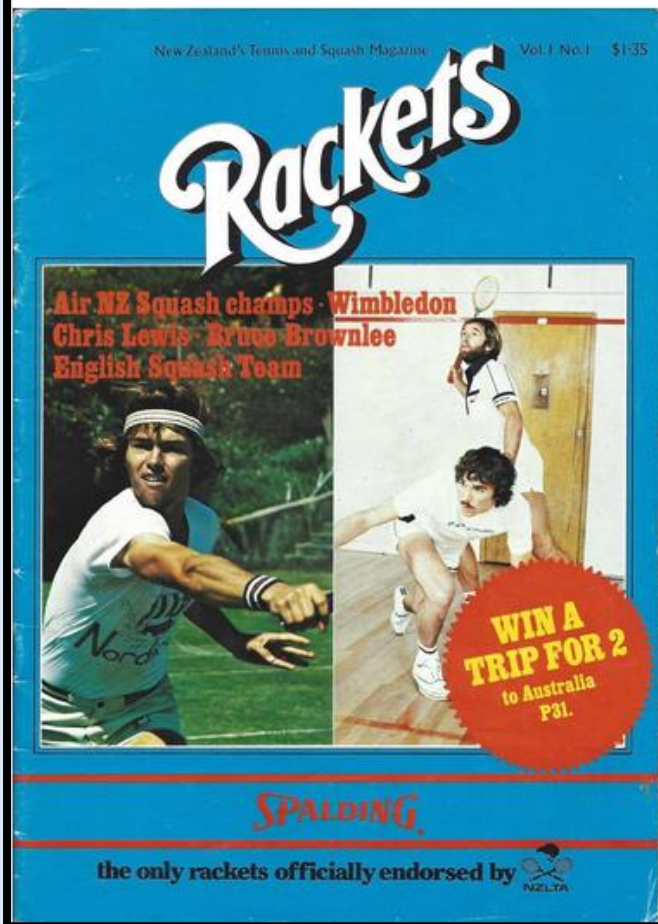

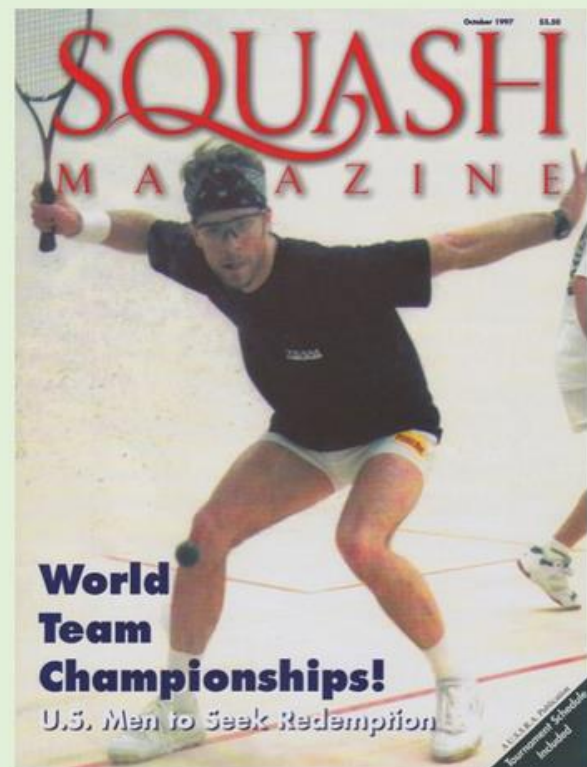

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The first issue of Squash Magazine (USA) was dated October 1997. The cover was of Marty Clark who had won the US Championships Open division the previous spring. The publisher was Jay Prince from Washington State, who previously handled Junior Tennis Magazine.

Squash News, run by Tom and Hazel Jones, was already operating, and was the official US Squash Association publication. Within two years of the Squash Magazine launch official status was switched to it.

A milestone in squash broadcast was reached in January 2010 when SquashTV, a live and video-on-demand platform was launched at the Tournament of Champions in New York.

Before then, the major Men's & Women's events were filmed by local broadcasters usually only from the semi-finals stage, sometimes for live national broadcasts. They then supplied tapes of the match recordings for production companies to produce highlights programmes on behalf of PSA (and WISPA then).

By ensuring all broadcasting rights were taken back in-house, PSA, via SquashTV took charge of filming and producing the programming – so eliminating the various standards of host broadcasters and ensuring continuity and consistent quality. The semi-finals and finals were available for broadcasters to take via satellite, whilst the earlier rounds were only available via streaming on the SquashTV website, which was a huge leap in matches available for viewing.

Howard Harding took on the role of World Squash Media Director for WSF, PSA & WISPA (who merged with PSA in 2015) in 1996, when the three bodies got together to make a joint appointment.

The 1996 announcement indicated that 'in the increasingly competitive media environment for sport we recognise the need to both coordinate and upgrade our media relations activities'. While the role for PSA / WISPA ceased a few years ago, over the period Harding issued over 8,000 media releases, liaising & communicating as well as being the focal point for media contact and information for the sport.

In 2003 he was awarded a WSF Outstanding Service Award, presented by 10 times British Open Champion Jahangir Khan (then WSF President), with the comment 'Howard's absolute dedication to his role has been outstanding. The hours he works and the commitment he shows are an example to us all'.

Photographic innovation

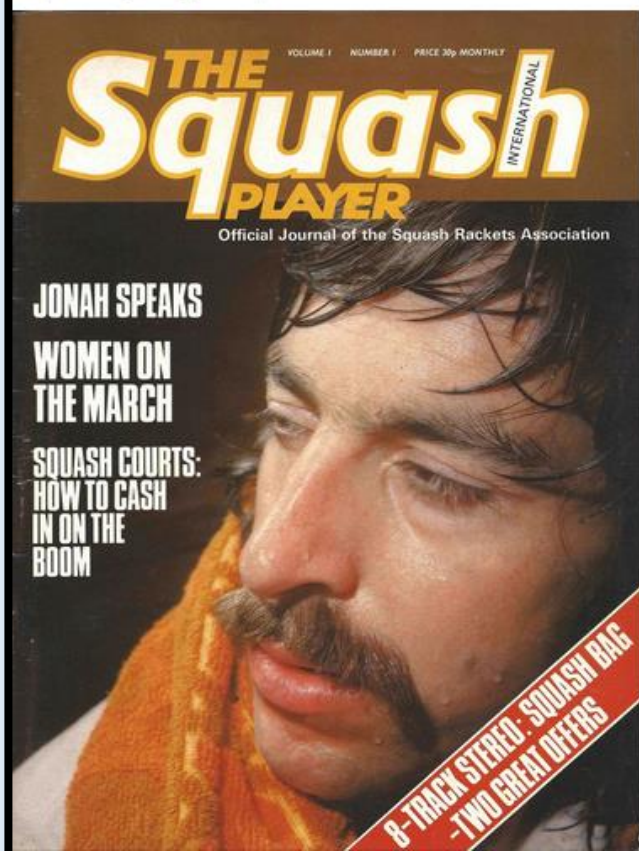
Squash Player photographer Steve Line has innovated a new squash photographic system. A wooden and perspex box protects the camera which sits at the front of the court below the tin.

An infra-red remote release works like a T.V. channel change on the pre-focused, motorwind camera. This allows Steve to take front court action shots without a camera pit.

"I was fed up with the restriction of photographing through a normal glass back," said Steve.



The very first edition of Squash Player Magazine in November 1971 covered the elevation of Men's British Open winner prize money to GBP500 courtesy of Benson & Hedges sponsorship. There was shock reported when Geoff Hunt announced he was turning pro, a profile of 'revolutionary' Jonah Barrington, and the defeat of a move to abolish amateur status (which was eventually abandoned in 1980). Twenty five years ago the internet was taking baby steps, and squash was an early embracer of the opportunities, many not fully imagined, that it would represent. By 1996, the 'Internet Squash Federation' the home page for squash, had been voted as 'one of the best organised of all sorts on the World wide Web'. Squash's introduction, what was then termed an interlinked information and news site for all squash data, was an initiative by Paul Baggott, a squash enthusiast from Newcastle University in England.

Then, the restrictive need was to have a computer, modem and internet provider have been overtaken by mobile phones, tablets, virtual assistants and so on, and we can hardly think about a time before the internet! (..... and what was having a web page 'clothed' all about?)
