

Today 50 years ago (8 April 1976), the 4th Men's European Team Championship began at the King Leopold Club in Brussels, Belgium (pic). The club had completed five courts, including a glass back with a gallery with a 200 spectator capacity.


This first hosting came two years after the formation of the Belgian Squash Federation.

The earlier national history included four courts being built in the Shell building in Brussels in the 1930s, two courts arriving at the Royal Beerschot Club in Antwerp in 1950. Both were later demolished but the upswing led by King Leopold translated into a number of new facilities being added, including a national centre in Herentals. [European Squash Federation](#)

Lambs Club demolition began during 2007 after the freehold was sold at the end of 2005, 20 years ago. It was opened in October 1979 by Mike Corby (inset). He reported that it was not economically possible to keep the nine-court club going and so sold the freehold to signal the end for the facility which not only catered for City of London based workers, but hosted events such as the British Open and British Junior Open during its lifetime.

Squash courts first arrived at the Edgbaston Priory Club in Birmingham in 1934 when two were built. Since then it has held the men's British Open in 1969 and 1970, along with early rounds more recently.

Rising to six courts when a new clubhouse was built in 1965 it became the coaching base of Nasrullah Khan (pictured at the club) who was instrumental in the success of Jonah Barrington, along with a number of other players who were attracted to his mentoring there. 

In 1974 Neil Kilpatrick and George Mieras fulfilled their mission of founding a new squash club in Edinburgh to cater for expanding demand when Colinton Castle Squash Club opened. Now, a year short of its 50th birthday the eight court club has closed down, its lease to use the grounds of Merchiston Castle School ending. Many international players will have known it from its hosting of the Scottish Junior Open, and it was the venue for the 1993 World Masters too.



Hasta La Vista, the world's largest squash club, is due to host the postponed World Masters next year on its 33 courts. The facility has already hosted multiple squash championships before, including the 2013 WSF World Junior Championships, the 2017 World Games and the European Masters Championships and European Team Championships in 2017 and 2018, respectively.

Owner Zenon Waniak added a demountable all-glass show-court in 2017 to support his bringing events to the Wroclaw, Poland facility.

Although squash had arrived in the United States earlier, (beginning at St Pauls School in Conover, New Hampshire and in private homes); Christmas Day 1900 was a landmark date for squash in USA.

It was on this date that the first court built at a club was opened. It was at the Racquet Club in Philadelphia at their original Walnut Street location. Slightly smaller than the standardised dimensions, and built entirely of wood for \$500, it proved to be an instant success.

This prompted the club to add three more courts two years later. Again, space constraints meant that they were slightly smaller than the standard 32' by 21'. Unlike the first, they were primarily cement constructed, including the floor, with only the front wall being wooden. The building costs had risen to \$1,630! [US SQUASH](#)

Abbedale, a suburb of Sheffield in England holds a special place in British squash history. Its 7th court, opened on 30 Oct 1971 was the first full glass back wall fin court enabling viewing across its full width.

When Manchester won the right to host the Commonwealth Games 2002, the venue building programme included a National Squash Centre - which is being used for the Manchester Open this week. In addition to six courts (convertible to four doubles), it included a showcourt (also convertible to doubles), mounted on a hover-pad system.

This enabled it to move through the opening built into the adjacent indoor running track and seating to be built round it for over 2,000 spectators, as pictured (the top photo from the Games 2002 shows the court in the athletics area, with the bottom shot showing the black partition it had moved through to enter the squash area).

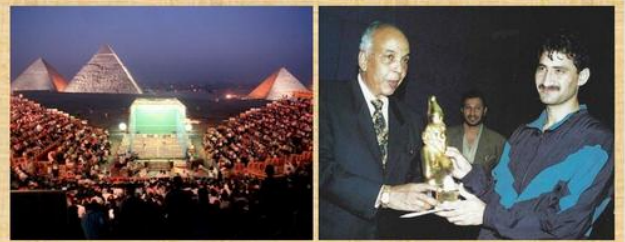
Egypt is synonymous with event hosting, currently in El Gouna, but World Federation founder members Egypt had hoped to host their first world championship – the world Amateur Team & Individual – back in 1979. However, while finances were no problem the lack of facilities prevented it. The National Stadium courts (below) would come on stream two years later so the first of the current 13 World Championship stagings in Egypt was the Men's Teams in 1985. 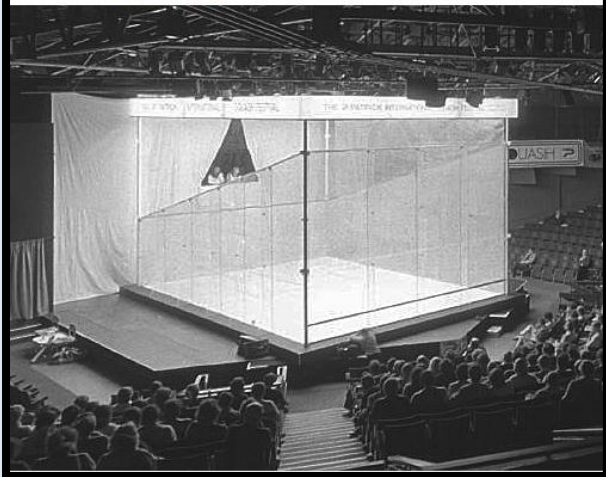

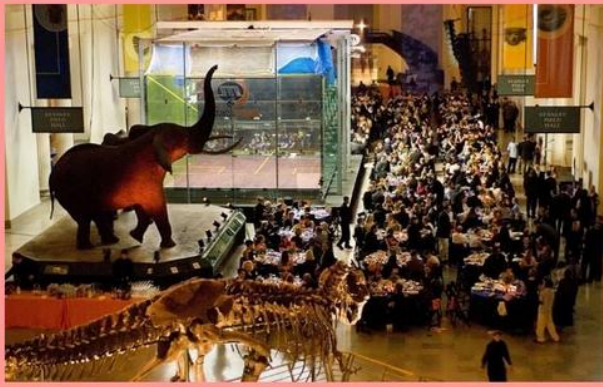

Squash may not have been played in prehistoric times, but in October 2007 it joined with them! The historic Jeu de Paume Club in central Paris is located on the top floor of a building between the Arc de Triomphe and the Trocadéro.

The club originated in 1908, and replaced one of its Paume (real tennis) courts with four squash courts in 1927, at a time when squash (or squash rackets as it was then called), was almost unknown in France. These courts became the starting point for squash in the country.

One court had part of a sidewall replaced with glass and now opens into the club lounge. The club hosted some matches in the WSF Women's World Team Championship in 2016.

The Calcutta Racket Club in India has a huge history, having been formed in 1793 and thus one of the oldest clubs in the world. The 'Racket' was not a reference to sport, but derived from the 'Racket Bird' that lived in the trees around its site! The club was initially known as the Fives Court or Gamekhana. The game of rackets gave way to squash in the 1930s.

A top venue, the Khalifa International Tennis and Squash Complex was officially opened by HH Sheikh Hamad Bin Khalifa al-Thani on 16 December 1992. Then it featured a showcourt and two glassbacks, but grew to a showcourt and 8 glassbacks courts to host the Asian Games 2006.

In addition to hosting the annual Qatar Classic International Championship, the Khalifa Centre has also been the venue for five Men's World titles, one Women's and a World Junior Championships too (dates on Library chart extract below & in full at <https://www.squashlibrary.info/features>).



As can be seen, there was no backwall viewing for the event.

You might have thought that the largest gallery for a court (above the solid back wall) in the 1950's would have been at the Lansdowne Club in London, home of the British Open, .... but that would have been incorrect. Until 1958 it was the Wanderers Club in Johannesburg, South Africa which could hold 300 - 400. Then in 1958 along came the pictured court which could hold 500 spectators, the majority in a towering block as well as 100 in two side galleries. It was built in the grounds of Cairo University. Another top ranking for Egypt! (The Lansdowne Club court had 144 seats and standing for 60 more).

Iconic Grand Central Terminal in NYC isn't the first station-based event. The British Nationals starting in Nottingham today was played at a station from 1985 - 1988. Bristol's Temple Meads Station is the oldest station in England, and became operational in 1840. The court was placed on the track-bed of the historic building, with seating on the old platforms.
