
A Message from the Minister of Municipal Affairs, Recreation and Housing




A Message from the President of Squash B.C.


A Message From The Arbutus Club President






Music Studios, Dance Studios, Gymnasium, Spa facilities and much, much more... Yes, The Arbutus Club really has it all!

World Team Championships

Tis tradition at every world championships, Men's or Women's, Junior or Senior that there be a world Team Championships involving the National teams of the participating countries. The individual championships are run along very traditional lines and often involve matches between players from the same countries. Major individual upsets are the exception rather than the rule.

In the Team Championships, however, each country selects its best three players, plus a substitute and Team Manager, and then prepares vigorously in an effort to become the best Squash Team in the world. The Team Championship is a wildly enthusiastic affair, in which every team gets an opportunity to display their national spirit. Teams are placed in pools according to their strength, and predetermined seeding. The results of the preceding World Championships are normally used to determine tournament seedings. For the 1992 Silver Unicorn Women's World Team Squash Championships, the teams have been placed in two pools of four, and two pools of five as follows.

Pools A and B involve the highest ranked countries from the previous championships held in Sydney, Australia, but all teams have the opportunity to reach the championship round. In recent years, the top countries have included England, Australia, New Zealand, Ireland, Germany and Finland. With the return, however, of former world power South Africa to the 1992 Silver Unicorn Women's World Championships, and the recent strength of the Canadian Team, led by Heather Wallace, upsets for 1992 may indeed be the rule, not the exception. Once the pool matches are played, teams advance into a predetermined play-off system leading to semi-finals and finals. The current world Team Champions are England. Watch out for some hectic Squash, a rousing atmosphere, major upsets and graphic demonstrations of team spirit!



Canada Emerging As A World Power

The dynamic sport of squash saw an unprecedented rise in popularity during the last decade. Canadians of all ages and in all regions of the country embraced the game. Although the squash boom appears to be over, the sport is enjoying steady growth.

Today, over 400,000 Canadians play squash at hundreds of private and public clubs, and educational institutions across the nation. The motivation to play squash varies from the desire for competition, fitness, or regular recreation to career aspirations. Certainly, squash is a lifetime sport.

Squash Canada

Squash Canada celebrated its 75th anniversary in 1989. From the first squash court, which was constructed in Quebec City in the 1800's, the Canadian Squash Racquets Association, formed in 1914, has grown to the present 410 clubs. In 1991, the association officially changed its name to Squash Canada.

Squash Canada is a federation of provincial and territorial squash associations governed by a council and represented by an Executive Committee. The Association employs a full-time Executive Director and Technical Director, and a small support staff who maintain the head office in Ottawa at the Canadian Sport and Recreation Centre.

Squash Canada organizes and coordinates a national schedule of competitions for men and women of all ages. It establishes national rankings and selects and trains Canadian Squash teams to represent our country at international events.

A major Squash Canada responsibility is that of player development. A national coaching certifi-

cation program has been established to increase the quality of instruction for aspiring young athletes. The inclusion of squash in the Canada Winter Games, beginning in February 1991, resulted in significant growth in junior development programming in all provinces and territories. Preparations have already begun for the 1995 Canada Winter Games which will be staged in Grand Prairie, Alberta.

Internationally, Canada has its Best-Ever Year

Heather Wallace started what was to be a banner year for Canadian Squash, when she won the Calgary International last October, beating Sarah Fitzgerald (8), Robyn Lambourne (2), Lucy Souter (14) and Michelle Martin (6). A month later she won the Finnish Open with a win over Suzanne Horner (11) in the Final. By April, Heather was among the top ten players in the World and ranked 7th.

Next, in the first round of the World Championships in Helsinki, the Canadian Men's Team upset New Zealand on the strength of performances by Gary Waite of Sarnia, and Jamie Crombie of Calgary. Waite defeated Ross Norman, ranked 9th in the World, 2-9, 9-5, 9-3, 9-5, while Crombie downed Rory Watt, ranked 16th, 9-5, 9-3, 9-7. This win proved that the Canadian Men can play squash with the best in the world. The team lost tough matches to Egypt and the Netherlands before beating Scotland to place 9th overall.

By the end of the season, Gary Waite improved his ISPA ranking to 18th (from 24th in November) with several good wins over players ranked above him such as Norman (9) and including Brett Martin (6) of Australia, Del Harris (12) of England and Simon Parks (14) of England. Crombie jumped from 58th to 40th and Jonathon Power climbed from 98th to 79th.

Finally, the Junior Men's team played to a brilliant third place finish at the Junior World Championships in Hong Kong last month. The team of Jonathon Power (Toronto), Graham Ryding (Toronto), Kelly Patrick (Calgary) and Rob Wilson (Calgary) finished second in their pool with wins over Pakistan, Germany, Sweden, Malaysia, and a loss to Australia. The Canadians

gave Australia a scare with Ryding playing out of his mind to defeat the Australian number 1, Gavin Caldwell (5), while Power took a much needed rest, and Patrick narrowly lost to Joseph Knepp (4) in five games. This left Canada facing England, the top-ranked team, in the semi-finals. Ryding, won the first, and then lost a close match to Justin Rennie, 5-9, 3-9, 9-5, 9-0, 9-4. Then Power defeated Nicholas Cass 9-6, 1-9, 9-3, 4-9, 9-0. Finally, Kelly Patrick followed his game plan to the letter for two games against Chris Clare, before he lost his concentration in the third game and subsequently lost the match 6-9, 5-9, 9-4, 9-1. The next day, the boys defeated Egypt 3-0 to win the bronze medal. The team was disappointed to have come so close to beating England, however, they proved that they could play squash with the very best juniors in the World and that the future of Canadian Squash is very bright.

Jonathon Power placed second in the World Junior Individual Championships defeating Justin Rennie (England) in the quarter-finals 7-9,

9-4, 9-5, 9-3, before losing in the final to John Raumolin (Finland) 5-9, 9-3, 9-7, 9-2. Jonathon lived up to his number 2 seeding and the promise of great things to come.

Squash Canada is working on a plan for its National Team program which will capitalize on the strength of our teams and the hard work of individual players like Wallace, Waite and Power.

Squash in Canada may be on the threshold of a new era based on the popularity of the sport with the Canadian public, and the potential of our elite players to be successful on the World arena.



Refereeing With The Three Judge System: A New Look at an Old Method

For decades the most contentious aspect of the game of squash has been the officiating. It is almost inevitable that when decisions (especially ones that involve interpretation) are made by one individual (the referee), the person affected (the player), will tend to disagree and might even become upset from time to time. As professional squash becomes more and more competitive and prize money increases, the problem of officiating (and the resulting disagreements) is getting more and more acute.

Perhaps the major problem in international squash tournaments

nowadays is the conflict that inevitably takes place between the referee and either one or both players (although it must be said that in this regard the women players are much better behaved than the men!). The referee does his or her best to make fair decisions, yet it is in the nature of the game that one or both players will frequently disagree with those decisions. The result is often a face-to-face, one-on-one clash that leads to further tension between players and officials and reflects badly on the sport.

These conflicts could in large measure be eliminated by the adoption of a system of officiating which involves three officials. Such a system would immediately remove the primary source of conflicts namely one person's disagreement with another's judgement. A decision made by three people is bound to be viewed as more convincing than a decision made by one person. While it is easy to believe that one person might have made an error (and that does happen from time to time in stressful circumstances!), it is very difficult to believe that three people will make the same error at the same moment—and that they will keep on doing so throughout a match! When two or more people see a situation the same way, that inevitably gives their decision more weight and credibility.

Thus we believe that the Three Official System, which we will be using throughout the two weeks of the Women's World Championships, greatly reduces the number of officiating errors, improves decision-making overall, and significantly helps players accept decisions that do not go in their favour. There is a noticeable reduction in the stress suffered by referees (three's company), the quality of decision-making in a

match is considerably enhanced, disagreements are virtually impossible (how do you argue with three people at once?), and both players and officials feel a lot better when the match is finally over.

In this promotion of the Three Judge System Canada has led the way. At the Canadian Open last October, this system was used for the first time ever in an I.S.P.A. event. After some initial scepticism on the part of the players, the system quickly found universal approval, and the experience even led Ross Norman (not a particularly good fan of referees) to write that this was the best officiated tournament he had ever attended, that the quality of decision-making was very high, that this was the first tournament at which he had seen no referee get flustered and there were no arguments between players and officials — in sum this system should have been introduced years ago!

Well, of course, it was: it is merely a refinement of the system that has been used in the hard-ball game for a very long time; but international soft-ball squash is a highly conservative sport, and changes are slow to be adopted. The officials working at these championships have come from all over the world, and many of them will be seeing and using the Three Judge System for the first time. During the second week of the Championships we hope to be able to demonstrate its superiority to the representatives of the I.S.R.F. member nations who are here for their Annual General Meeting. It is our hope that everyone who attends these Championships, players, officials, and spectators will come to realise that the Three Judge System has some major advantages. All that, however, is secondary to our ultimate aim which is to ensure that each rally, each game, each match has the fairest possible outcome and that the true winner emerges. If we can achieve that, then the system will have proved its worth.
