Squash Library is saddened to report that Pakistani champion Aftab Jawaid has died in his adopted Manchester yesterday, aged 67.

The tall elegant player won the British Amateur three times (1964-66) – the first Pakistani to take the title – as well as being losing finalist in three British Opens. He then settled in the north west of England, and became a well-loved coach.

The Library is saddened to report that Ibrahim Amin, one of the early 'greats' of Egyptian Squash, passed away last night. Born in Cairo in 1934, he took up the sport aged fourteen at the Alamein Club, and his early talent was clear when he won the Cairo Under 16 championship.

In 1955 he travelled to UK and won the British Amateur championship on his debut. This title was followed up by two runner-up spots in 1957 and 1958 before winning again in 1959, beating countryman Tawfik Shafik in the final. Another two years of losing finals followed.

In December 1964 he reached the British Open final, losing 3-1 to another star Egyptian Abdul Fattah Abou Taleb, who was winning the second of three consecutive titles.

When Egypt played in the 2nd Men's World Team Championship in England in 1969, tall and stylish Amin was their player manager.

Not surprisingly, as Amin combined charm with effectiveness, in 1972 he was appointed as Honorary Secretary of the Egyptian Association, and continued supporting and pushing Egyptian squash forward for many years afterwards. [Egyptian Squash Federation - الاتحاد المصري للإسكواش](#)

30 years ago in 1993, the 'Mr Squash' of his era died aged 87. Englishman John Horry MBE became the first full time CEO (then called Secretary) of the British SRA in 1955 when it was the unofficial world body, then doubled up as the first Secretary of the fledgling world body itself (ISRF) when it began in 1967. He held the ISRF position until he retired in 1975, having stepped down from the SRA three years earlier.

Managing all the duties on his own, he did take on assistants who would do a little work while being given the opportunity to train. Jonah Barrington was one, Tony Swift and Mike Corby amongst others too.

Only a modest player himself, his organisational skills and attention to detail enabled him to ensure that the management of what became a growing sport was in good hands. Irrascible at times, but with a drive and a generosity of spirit, John Horry was not only known by all, but respected by all too.

Geoff Kingscote had a full life, which included being termed the father of New Zealand Squash. English born in 1888, he served in the first World War, and had been a regular player at the Bath Club in London before traveling to New Zealand to work and becoming their first national champion at Christchurch Club in 1932.

He did so having been credited with introducing the drop shot to the country!

Ahmed Safwat would have been 76 years old today, but 20 years ago today he died aged 56. The Egyptian professional had not realised that he had an enlarged heart, and died of heart failure.

Jonah Barrington summed him up so well, saying, 'He was a lovely man, a natural gentleman who was great to play – there was hardly ever a let. Everybody warmed to him, adults and youngsters alike.'

Reaching a career high ranking of seven in 1977, he continued playing Masters squash winning the British Open Over 35, and World Masters Over 40 and 50 titles.

Only narrowly surviving, being as tough in the fight as he was on court, his slow recovery was hampered by complications that finally caused his death.

Mr Tetsuya Kobayashi from Japan has passed away, aged 85. A genial businessman who became attracted to squash when seeing it, he was instrumental in supporting the development and profile of squash in Japan in the 1990s through his JSM (Japan Squash Merchandising Company). Not only did he build the Cote-A-Cote Squash Club in Yokohama, but constructed JSM glass and movable wall courts too.

During the period 1993 – 1995 period his Men's and Women's JSM SuperSquash events set the record for the largest Tour prize money at the time. He also supported the Women's Tour with WISPA sponsorship (he is seen here with Michelle Martin, 1993 & 94 winner). Dr Assem Allam sadly passed away today (2 Dec 2022) at the age of 83 after a prolonged illness. Heading Allam Marine, he took over the sponsorship of the British Open in 2012 with that year being played at the O2 in London. It then relocated to Hull, where he had lived since 1986, with the 10th edition taking there earlier this year; and so eclipsing the nine sponsored by Hi-Tec ending in 1994.

A squash enthusiast as well as a supporter, all event players would remember him sitting in the front row at almost all matches, and genially welcoming them off court at the end of their matches. Squash has lost a great man and great benefactor.





Abdul Bari, a distant relative of the 'Khan Dynasty' had been British Open runner up in 1950 when beaten by Mahmoud Karim.

Two years later he became the first Pakistani to become a professional coach in England when he was appointed by the Junior Carlton Club in London in 1952. But two years later on 9 December 1954 he died from a brain haemorrhage aged only 33.

Almost immediately a memorial match was arranged to raise funds for his wife and two year daughter.

Played on the Bruce Court at the Lansdowne Club in London, led by his family, all the Pakistani pros in UK came together to play a selected English team; the outcome being a comfortable win for the Pakistani pros, on a night when the result didn't matter.



New Zealander Murray Day, the second President of the WSF (then called ISRF) passed away at the age of 90 (18 March) in Waikato, NZL. Day took the helm of ISRF in 1975 when the head role was called Chairman, and such was his success in moving the body forward, the member nations voted to extend the maximum period in position from four to six years, so allowing him to serve until 1981.

He spearheaded the break from the sports' administration being UK-centric, streamlined communication, and modernised the sport.

Day presided over the game going 'open' (<http://www.squashlibrary.info/.../squash-abolishes...>), and started the process of amalgamating the management of men's and women's international bodies.



On this day 54 years ago (16.03.68) Eleonora Sears died. She had become the first US Women's squash champion, at the age of 46 in 1928. She did so having been involved in the formation of the United States Women's Squash Racquets Association that year. 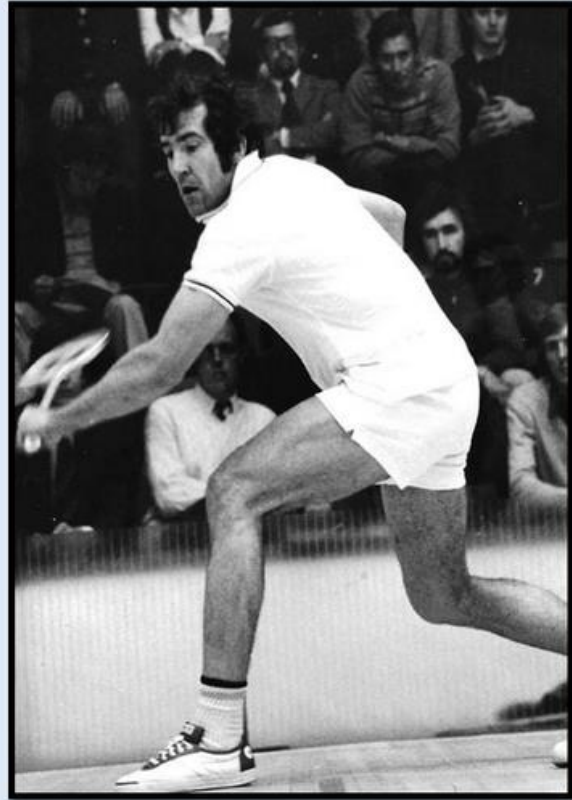

Born 3.12.1948, he had won the British Amateur title before turning professional, and the New Zealand Open in 1981 afterwards. 1961 Women's British Open champion Fran Marshall passed away aged 81 ten years ago. She was famous for being the last person to beat Heather McKay before the Australian went on an unbeaten streak in the sport that lasted an incredible sixteen years. The win was a 3/2 victory in the Scottish Open final 1962 which took an hour and a half to secure.

Marshall was also runner-up in the British Open five times and English number one for over ten years.

She had been raised in Kenya before returning to Yorkshire and, after her competitive retirement, coached before moving to Spain in 1983.

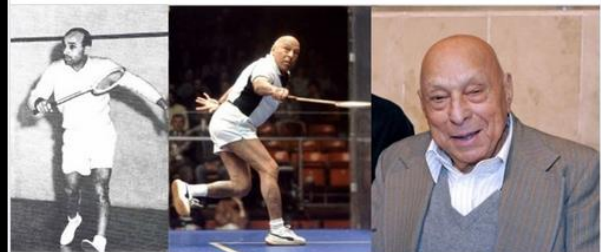

Hashim Khan, a father figure of modern squash, died on this day (18 Aug) in 2014, just after what was believed to be his 100th birthday. Born near Peshawar in Pakistan (possibly on 1 July 1914, but he never had a birth certificate), Khan led his country's pre-eminent status in the sport in the 20th century. In the 1950s he won a then record seven British Open titles - his first in 1951 at an age when most players have long retired.

He moved to the USA in the 1960s and died at his Colorado home. He had been based at the Denver Athletic Club and was still giving advice from the gallery after finally hanging up his rackets aged 93.

On this day 70 years ago (27.09.1951), Torsam Khan was born. Torsam, son of 1957 British Open winner Roshan Khan and brother of ten times British Open winner Jahangir Khan, tragically collapsed and died on court playing the Australian Open in Adelaide on 28 November 1979. The Rawalpindi born Pakistani was aged just 28.

Ranked 13 in the world at the time the engaging and popular player had already made his mark as a leader, having become President of ISPA (now PSA) nine months earlier.

Eight years ago today (20 June 2013) Dicky Rutnagur, the highly-respected Indian-born British-based journalist who covered squash, badminton and cricket for the Daily Telegraph died in London aged 82. He also authored, Khans Unlimited – A history of Squash in Pakistan.

In an era before the reporting world changed with the advent of internet, Dicky Rutnagur was already a doyen of the craft. His encyclopaedic knowledge of squash players and championships, his direct and accurate mode of reportage - whether it be squash or his other love cricket – along with his wicked sense of humour, led Dicky to be held in the highest esteem by players, promoters and his publications alike.

England international John Le Lievre (born 9 June 1956) died yesterday (23 May 2021) after lengthy suffering from Lewy Body Dementia disease.

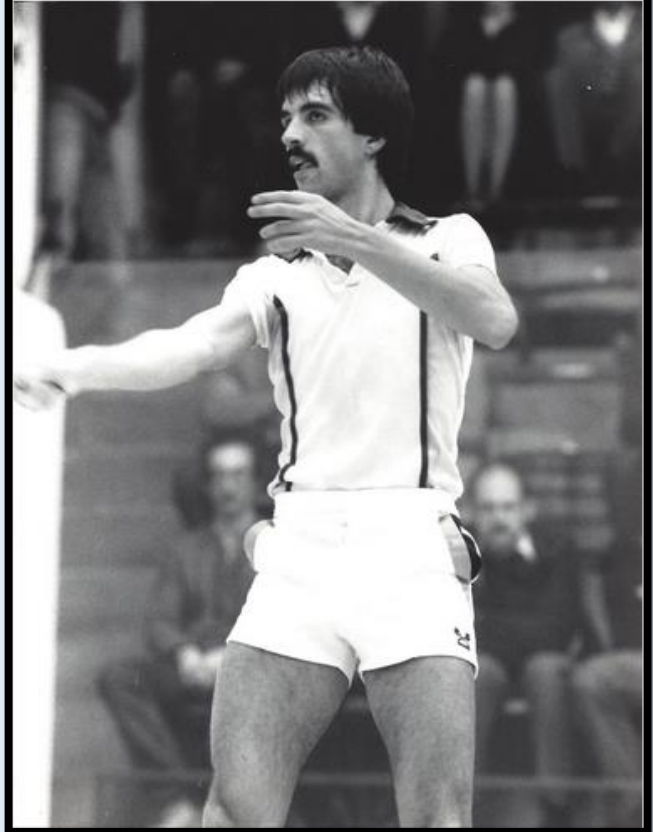
John was born on the island of Guernsey and represented England at both junior & senior level, winning 16 senior caps between 1977 – 1982.

Based in Nottingham, on court he will be remembered as a precise player who operated at very much his own pace, frustrating opponents, who reached 24 in the world. While off court he was genial, endearing and immensely popular.

The phrase 'nobody had a bad word to say about him' was so true of John Le Lievre.



Ten years ago this month squash lost Sergio Rodriguez Jaramillo, Founder and President of the Pan-American Squash Federation (FPS). He was aged 52 when he was killed in Medellin, Colombia. Rodriguez was a member of the Executive of the Colombian Olympic Committee - and later became Treasurer. His work both in the Olympic movement and in Squash made him an internationally respected sports leader. In lamenting the loss of Rodriguez, then WSF President N Ramachandran said: "The untimely death of Sergio Rodriguez is a great shock and a terrible tragedy. First and foremost for his loved ones, but squash and sport in general has lost a great friend whose contribution has been enduring. He will be greatly missed." 
