AMENDED MOTION - OFFICERS

"That the ISRF recognises that ownership of the Men's World Open title is vested with the International Squash Players Association on the understanding that:

- The ISPA recognises and acknowledges the ISRF's sole and exclusive right to promote and organise World Squash Championships for individuals and teams at senior and junior level for both men and women.
- That in years when the Men's World Open and Men's World Team Championships are to be held together, a combined application is made to both the ISPA and the ISRF by the Host Association,

and

- That the ISRF recognises the winner of the Men's World Open as World Champion in the absence of the ISRF not itself organising a World Individual Championship for Men."
 - Roger Eady of ISPA confirmed that his Association understood and supported the motion by the Officers.



On this day (6 Nov) in 1989 Australian Chris Dittmar beat Jahangir Khan 15-9 12-15 15-9 9-15 15-13 in nine minutes short of two hours in the Men's World Open semi-finals at the Putra World Trade Centre in Kuala Lumpur. A day later he met Jahangir's Pakistani countryman Jansher Khan in the final, coming so close to beating the pre-eminent pair. In another titanic match he went down 10-15 6-15 15-4 15-11 15-10 in 1hr 44m.

(His KL win was the second of eight World Open crowns for Jansher, beating Dittmar in his first four finals).




On this day in 2005 (4.12.05) Nicol David won the first of her eight World Women's Championship titles.



Over the years, after the World Masters began with solely Over 45, age bands developed into five year ones from Over 35.
When the first stand-alone World Masters event was held in 1991, there were 11 five-year bands (Men's 35+ to 60+, and Women's 35+ to 55+). Now there are 19 bands with Men's expanded up to 80+ and Women's 75+. The Women's first reached Over 70 in 2008, while the men's initiated Over 75 in 2006, with Over 80 first played in Birmingham, England in 2012 (pic).






When the Men's World Open was played for the second time at the Palais Des Sports in Toulouse, France on 6 – 11 November 1990, there were two showcourts used. And, interestingly, the two Puchaux courts had different colour floors – green and blue, as pictured.

The final was played on green, Pakistan's Jansher Khan beating Australian Chris Dittmar 15-8, 17-15, 13-15, 15-7 to take the third of his eight World Open titles.

When the World Federation Men's Team & Individual Championships were first played in 1967 a few founder member nations of the newly formed Federation offered to provide trophies, with the result that this was minuted (with Full history at https://www.squashlibrary.info/mens-world-team-champions):

It was agreed that the prize of each trophy including a suitable box should not exceed £100; that one trophy should be made in India (Individual) and the other in Pakistan (Team); that the Chairman should decide on the design for the trophies.


Four nations have reached Men's World Team Championship finals, without having won a title so far. New Zealand (1977, 1985, 1987), Canada (1997), Wales (1999) and France (2003, 2009).

Meanwhile, two nations have reached Women's World Team Championship finals, without having won a title so far. New Zealand (1985, 1992) and Malaysia (2014). 



The first Men's World Open was not played as a separate event - the World Federation agreed in 1975 that the winner of the 1976 British Open would be awarded the world title too. It was played at the Wembley Squash Centre in London, 31 Jan – 9 Feb 1976, and 2nd seed Australian Geoff Hunt beat 4th ranked Mohibullah Khan 7-9, 9-4, 8-10, 9-2, 9-2 in the final. The 130 minute match was the longest recorded at that point. Two other Pakistanis, Qamar Zaman & Gogi Alauddin were seeded 1 & 3 respectively. Hunt (pictured with the two trophies) went on to win the next three World Open titles too, beating Qamar Zaman in each final.

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


The only two occasions that the Women's World Junior Individual event has taken place with the Women's World Open were the 2nd & 3rd stagings in 1983 in Perth, Australia and 1985 in Dublin Ireland.

Both editions included Junior Individual events which began in 1981, while The Irish edition in 1985 saw the first Women's Junior Team Championship. World Squash Federation





The first time that the Women's & Men's World Championships were staged together was 27 Nov – 4 Dec 2005 in Hong Kong, China, won by Amr Shabana (EGY) and Nicol David (MAS). Since then joint 'Worlds' have taken place in Manchester (2008 & 2017), Rotterdam (2011) and Chicago (2019). Squash - PSA World







Although World Squash Championships have been held in all the five global squash regions, the first held in mainland China was the WSF Women's World Team event in 2018. I was held 11 – 16 September in the city of Dalian.

It took place at the Xigang Stadium, home of a squash centre with four permanent all-glass courts made by the Chinese CGG court company.

For the event a further two showcourts were erected in the sport hall – making it unique in using six glass showcourts for an event! World Squash Federation






The format of World Team Championships now mean that ordinarily a nation plays a maximum of seven ties. But go back to October 1987 where the entry for the Men's World Team Championship in England was eight more than the previous record, the format meant that 20 nations were given direct access into initial pools, joined by four qualifiers from the two preliminary pools of four teams. The winners went straight through but the second & third in the pools had a playoff tie.

After six team pools, the final stage was 1 – 8, 9 – 16 and 17 – 24 places. This meant that Norway, and Kuwait who succeeded in the preliminary pools after playoffs had played a total of 12 times. And only two players – Norway's Johan Abyholm (left) and Kuwaiti Tariq Al-Oweish, featured in all 12. For the record, Abyholm won 8, while Al-Oweish won 2.









Nour El Sherbini is the only player to have won three World Junior Individual titles – which she did as the event moved to annual from every two years in 2009. Her first in 2009 came when she was aged just 13 (pic), with the next two following in 2012 and 2013.

In 1997 Rio De Janiero became the first South American World Championship venue, when the Brazilian city hosted the Women's World Junior Individual and Team Championship between 27 July – 9 August.

(Individual champion was England's Tania Bailey, who beat Isabelle Stoehr, France, 9-6, 9-1, 9-7 in the final, England beating New Zealand 2/1 in the team final).

The only subsequent South American World Championship hosting to this point came in 2010 when Ecuador's capital Quito hosted the Men's Junior.

The WSF initiated a World Cup, the first mixed national team world championship, in 1996. Played 28 May – 1 June in Petaling Jaya, Malaysia, 16 teams competed for a \$70,000 prize fund, with Australia beating England 3/0 in the final.

(Brett Martin bt Mark Chaloner, Michelle Martin bt Suzanne Horner, Rodney Eyles bt Chris Walker).

Subsequent events were held in 1999 in s'Hertogenbosch, Netherlands, and in Chennai, India in 2011. An Under 21 age World Cup was also played in Chennai in 2012. World Squash Federation





The full Men's World Junior compendium in the Library at www.squashlibrary.info/features, includes a draw for the Men's World Junior Individuals in Hong Kong in 1992, with two players who would go on to become World Open Champions – Jonathon Power (CAN, 1998) and Thierry Lincou (FRA, 2004) but neither won the event.

The first 'stand-alone' World Masters event was held in Auckland, New Zealand, in 1991. Before then various Men's & Women's Masters events held with other Championships were given World Championship status. The first was in 1976 when the Men's British Open Masters events, then called Veterans and Vintage events (the informal titles for the Over 45 and Over 55 age groups), were upgraded to World Championship status. When Frenchman Thierry Lincou won the Men's World Championship in Doha, Qatar in 2004 he became the first player from mainland Europe to lift the trophy. (Peter Nicol, then Scotland) was the first European to do so in 1999.

These two have been followed by Nick Matthew (England, 2010, 11, 13) & Gregory Gaultier (France, 2015) as the only other European men to win the title. The first World University Squash Championships took place from 3 - 11 August 1996 in Maastricht, Netherlands. Brazil's Paul Connelly beat Canadian Kelly Patrick in the final (after taking out Thierry Lincou in the semis).

Women's winner was Kim Hannes (Belgium), who beat Kelly Buckley in their final. Gt Britain won the mixed team event, beating France



11 November 1986 was a squash milestone – being the date when Ross Norman ended Jahangir Khan's Syear 7month unbeaten spell in the final of the World Open at the Palais Des Sports in Toulouse, France.

But three years earlier was a significant time too. The summer of 1983 was when the New Zealander wrecked his knee landing awkwardly on the edge of the runway at the end of his first ever parachute jump. He reported it as 'it felt like falling out of a two-storey building'. Having severed one ligament and displaced another it seemed unlikely that he would play again. He did, and the rest, as they say, is history!






The first time total prize money of STmillion was offered was the PSA Men's & Women's World Championships which took place in Chicago, USA, sponsored by the Walter family, 23 February – 2 march 2019. The purse was equal for both genders, guaranteed the largest winner prize money ever (won by Egyptians Nour El Sherbini & Ali Farag), and doubled the sum offered for the 2018 Windy City Open, also funded by the Walter family. 







While Australian Chris Dittmar holds the record of five World Open final appearances without winning any (as previously posted), only one behind is Pakistani 'magician' Qamar Zaman with four. Three consecutively to Geoff Hunt (1977, 79, 80 – not held 78) and once to Jahangir Khan (1984). 

When Jonathon Power beat Peter Nicol 3-1 to win the World Open in Qatar in 1998 the Canadian became the first and so far only Pan-American man or women to win the World Championship. The region has done better in the Juniors though, with Amanda Sobhy (USA, 2010) and Diego Elias (Peru, 2014 & 2015) winning World Junior individual titles. 








For every World Open winner there is a final loser too. The record of number of finals reached without a win goes to two great players who were very unlucky not to have won a 'worlds'. Australian Chris Dittmar with five, losing four times to Jansher Khan, (87, 89 in pic, 90 & 92) and once to Jahangir Khan (84). Natalie Grinham lost three finals under the Australian flag Vanessa Atkinson (04), Nicol David (06) and sister Rachael (07); and one to David (09) as a Dutch player.



The first Men's World Open took place in 1976, not separately but as a joint title with the British Open - as a month before the start the sponsorship had not been found to fund the prize money. At that point a chance meeting between Jonah Barrington and an executive from British automotive company Lucas Industries led to a last-minute rescue enabling Australian Hunt to beat Pakistani Mohibullah Khan in the final 7/9, 9/4, 8/10, 9/2, 9/2 to win the first of his three World Opens (after previously winning three World Amateur crowns).









Jansher Khan holds the record for Men's World Championship titles, with 8, two ahead of fellow Pakistani Jahangir Khan. His first was in 1987 in England, the last in his own country, in Karachi, in 1996. 



With Egypt seeded one and hot favourites to retain the WSF Men's World Team Championship this month their path towards dominance may be relatively short, but is clear.

It started with the Junior Men's in 1994 when Egypt won their first ever team title led by Ahmed Barada & Omar Elborollosy. (All are biennial and this one has been won six times).

Juniors moved up and after the first Men's won on home ground in 1999, four of these titles have been won in all – but with England proving to be a stumbling block with three of their own during this period.

The same pattern was followed on the female side with the juniors coming first. After a first title in 1999 the girls have eight in total including the last six.

The Egyptian Women's team took their first title in 2008 and have four titles in all.

The Land of The Pharaohs currently hold all four major World Team titles.

The Men's World Championship starting today in Qatar is the fifth held there. The first in Doha was in 1998 and saw Canadian Jonathon Power win the title, beating Peter Nicol (Scotland at that point, later England) 15-17, 15-7, 15-9, 15-10.

It was Power's one World title – with Nicol winning his own single one a year later after two R/Ups.
