George Bernard Shaw died 75 years ago. The Irish playwright wrote more than sixty plays, including Pygmalion, and after his death in 1950 this book was published: Bernard Shaw's Rhyming Picture Guide to Ayot Saint Lawrence.

The village of Ayot Saint Lawrence north of London was where he lived – in a house called Shaw Corner, and featured in his rhyming guide was this photo of a squash court in the grounds, along with his lines. The court is not there anymore, but when it was taken out of use is not certain.



Save where our folk, to play squash rackets  
Within this court take off their jackets.

40 years ago in 1985 the UK Sports Council accepted that, with nearly 10,000 players in the UK, racketball (now re-named Squash57) should become an officially recognised sport; a month later the inaugural racketball championships were held — the North of England at Leicester Squash & Badminton Club and the South of England at Sutton & Cheam Squash Club — and then on December 1 the winners from these two tournaments clashed at the Metropolitan Club in South London to find the sport's first national champions.

Essex-based Denis Secher, became the first men's national champion and Greer Batty from the West Midlands clinched the women's championship.

THE BRITISH  
RACKETBALL

In the heavyweight (literally!) book titled British Sports And Sportsmen, dated around 1929, the editor speculated on whether the sport should be titled rackets or racquets. It had been noted that squash pro Charles Arnold had titled his 1926 book 'The Game of Squash Racquets'. It is only in the last few decades that the sport has generally dropped either after the word squash. Here are the notes:

to their own advantage. It may not pass unnoticed that H.R.H. spells the name of the game "racquets," not as other authorities, such as the late Mr. Noel, set the fashion. Mr. Arnold also spelt it as does the Prince, but it is ventured to suggest that the latter, if he gave the matter a thought at all, spelt the word as he found it spelt by Arnold, so in this work we shall continue to spell it "rackets," as has been the fashion in the original "Badminton Library" and in most if not all subsequent works on the subject. If it was known that the Prince of Wales was of the opinion that Mr. Arnold's way was the most classical and therefore the most academically correct, we should, as loyal subjects, have instructed the printer to make the necessary alteration in the text already in print.

The Bath Club in London was one of the earliest and most influential squash clubs, when built in 1904 (details and photo in <https://www.squashlibrary.info/squash-a-celebration>). Shortly after it opened Charles Arnold became the resident pro there. It changed ownership and location and became Bath & Racquets Club, where yesterday Stuart Hardy (left), England Squash Masters Chair and squash collector, presented Director Simi Panesar (centre) and Hiddy Jahan (right) an autographed Arnold model racket and Arnold's book titled a Handbook of Squash Rackets, published in 1926. Former top star Jahan, who has coached there for 34 years, and Panesar were left to discuss where to display Hardy's gift to them.



Ned Bigelow (pic) died 55 years ago in 1970. He was a mover and shaker in the squash community, and the man who initiated the US Open at the University Club in New York in 1954, beginning on New Years Day. It was won by American Henri Salaun, who beat Hashim Khan in the final. The Pakistani star did adapt quickly to the North American game and subsequently won the title three times (1956,57,63). Meanwhile, Salaun won the US National title four times in total, but not another US Open. [US SQUASH](#)



Sports do seem to have terms they use that are exclusive to them, and sometimes with their origin somewhat shrouded in mystery. While for squash some terms can be easily explained e.g. the tin, which was originally made of tin, two examples that are not obvious are boast and nick. Possibilities for them:

### BOAST

Perhaps English from past centuries provides a clue as *boast* was linked to *rebound* or *deflect*. Couple that with another meaning of a *bold* / *tricky move*, so a shot that reaches the front wall via the side wall could have been linked to them.

### NICK

Again, the past English meaning of a *notch* or *groove* may be the origin. Could it be that the ball going into a *niche*, pronunciation evolving into *nich* and *nick* be the route to our usage? (Certainly, as reported by Peter Eedy, an Australian newspaper 1949 discussing Mahmoud Karim said 'He plays deliberately for the sidewall niches near the front a great deal'.

When the SRA in England was formed in 1928 it set out rules for vacant titles when events were played as challenges rather than knockout. The Men's British Open was played as a best of three matches until 1947 (<https://www.squashlibrary.info/.../men-s-british-open-the-...>).

## SUGGESTIONS TO GOVERN COMPETITION FOR A VACANT TITLE OR TO ELIMINATE MORE THAN ONE APPROVED CHALLENGER

The following are not intended to be Rules.

They are to be subject to the widest discretionary power of the S.R.A., who may also accept or refuse entries or seed the draw.

The purse for each match shall be divided two-thirds to the winner and one-third to the loser. (See paragraph 9.)

- (a) The knock-out principle is suggested.
- (b) Every match shall be played in a neutral standard court in the British Isles with standard balls and rackets.
- (c) The S.R.A. shall decide the court and make of ball for each match. They will consider the wishes of the players in these matters.
- (d) At least three days' rest between matches is suggested.
- (e) One practice game in the court to be used shall be allowed to each competitor before each match.

Nos. 12, 17, 18, 19 and 20 of the Conditions Governing the Professional Squash Rackets Championship of the British Isles shall also govern this competition.

Ten years ago in 2015 the WSF Coach Education Programme was launched. It was the start of a worldwide unified and standardised coaching structure for Squash, launched with the opening of WSF Level 1 coach candidate registration. Players there have included Lucia Bautista, Colombia number 1 and Pan-American doubles champion, Jose Santamaria, bronze medal in World Juniors 2024, and other top juniors in the region.

In 1936 a letter to a UK's racket sports magazine suggested that handicapping could be done with the better player having to play left-handed. (Interestingly, it seems that in past times it was assumed that all players would be right-handed!). Bisques, which were also mentioned were adopted later for a UK club / company team competition ('The Austin Reed'), running up to the 1980s.

Dear Captain Dicks,

Year after year, we hear players complaining of the drawbacks in the existing handicap method and those of us who have taught many beginners know where the system is faulty. It is mainly due to "Hand-Out" being forced to win two strokes successively before he can secure a point and this favours the stronger player to an enormous degree.

The plan I have adopted with all my beginner friends is, for want of a better name—the "Bisque" system. For example, a player given four "Bisques" has a right to become "Hand-In" or to continue as "Hand-In" at any stage of the game, and he can exercise this option on four occasions, and naturally the number of "Bisques" given vary according to the prowess of each player.

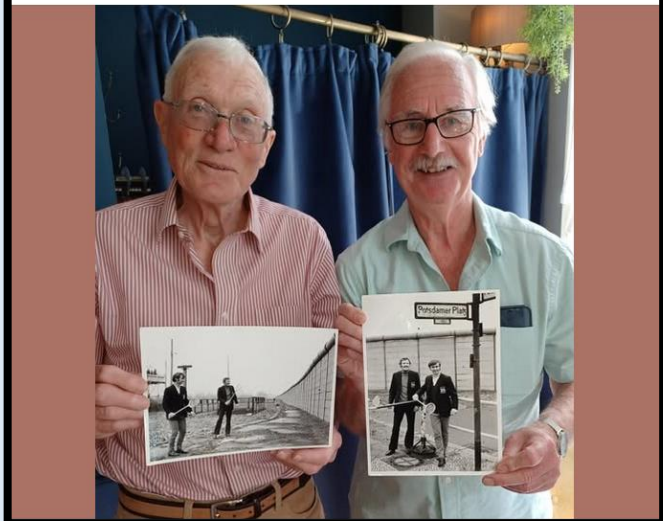

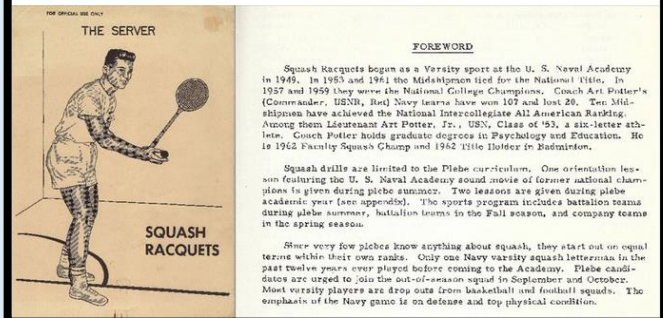

The debate about the oldest continuously operating squash club includes Aberdeen Squash Club in Scotland, established in 1913. Meanwhile the Toronto Racquet Club preceded it, albeit moving premises. Here is a letter written by their representative in 1948 stating their claim. [Squash Canada/Scottish Squash](#)

#### The Oldest Squash Club?

December 21st, 1948

The Editor,  
British Lawn Tennis and Squash,  
Dear Sir,

I have just been perusing a circular letter of yours dated November 10th, together with a reprint of an article on the Jesters Club, which appeared in your November issue. I note with interest an article on the back of the reprint under the title "Which is the Oldest Squash Club" and was surprised to learn that a club with as recent an origin as 1909 could be advanced as the oldest.

Perhaps your article has produced many responses and this of mine may not be in the running at this date. However, for whatever interest it may have to you, the Toronto Racquet Club was organised in 1905; and was incorporated as a limited liability company by letters patent issued by the Province of Ontario later in that year. The courts were opened for play on October 16th, 1905. The club has been in continuous existence since that time, although playing facilities were suspended during the first great war.

The club has always been solely for the playing of squash, and affords almost no facilities other than that. It has probably the most active playing strength of any of the clubs that I know in these parts, with a better average ability, due, of course, to its limited purpose; and this in spite of the fact that membership is limited to about 100.

Many of the original members are still members, though no longer active players.

During the last war a very high percentage of the members were on active service, but the club managed to carry on without shutting down the courts. The writer himself was away for nearly 5 years but managed to get a few games in during the period of waiting in England, playing at the R.A.C. Belsize Park, Brockenhurst, Blackdown, and at the Staff College, Sandhurst, also on the private court of Capt. E. George Spencer Churchill, M.C., in Glos.

Squash is enjoying a great popularity here these days, but in a more restricted circle than seems to be the case in England. Almost no women play hereabouts; and of course, a woman has never got her face inside the door of our own club.

Best wishes to yourself, and also to Aberdeen; but the latter will have to think up some other claim to fame than the one in your article.

Arthur Winnington Ingram (1858 - 1946) was Bishop of London from 1901 to 1939, and an enthusiastic squash player. He played at the Bath Club seemingly starting in mid-life, coached by pro Charles Arnold. He played squash with the Prince of Wales (later Edward VIII), usually beating him despite the age difference.

As a 68 year old, on a tour to universities in the USA in 1926, he requested playing students at tennis and at squash, as he was, as he himself said, "still playing these games pretty well". In 1934 a British newspaper described Ingram, then 76 year old, as "the Peter Pan of the Church, he positively refuses to grow old".

And in January 1937, the year this photo was taken, Ingram played a squash match at the Bath Club on the day of his 79th birthday against his coach Charles Arnold, to celebrate the occasion. Ingram won by 3-1, and afterwards Arnold commented that "the Bishop must be one of the most remarkable athletes the country has known".

Back in 1987 the disused St Cuthbert's Church was an innovative way to provide squash courts in Middlesbrough, England (bottom). It was called Phoenix Squash Club, and featured five courts as well as two badminton courts. Similarly, in 1976 in Scotland the Bridge of Weir Church was converted to house two courts - the organ loft providing a gallery (top). So, there were services going on again!

Our new King is well known to all of us as a player of Squash Rackets. To Charles Arnold of the Bath Club fell the great honour of teaching King Edward, then Prince of Wales, all there is to know of the game of Squash Rackets, and as Prince of Wales the King proved a first-class pupil. He played in the Amateur Championships of 1924, 1925, 1926 and 1927, and during his tours abroad he played in most countries of the world where Squash Rackets courts were to be found. His great fondness for the game caused him to have a court built in the battleship H.M.S. Renown. Although it is some time since His Majesty took part in competitive Squash Rackets, he became a member of the Jesters Club towards the end of 1934 and more recently the first Royal Patron of the Squash Rackets Association.

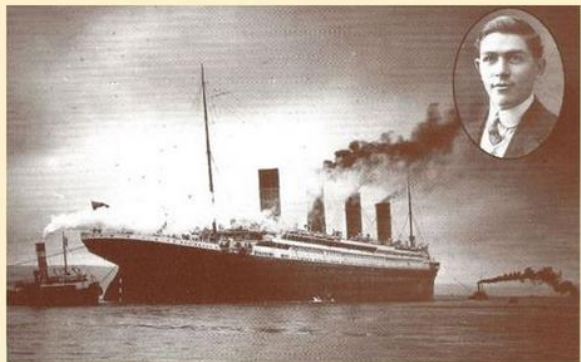

Before the SRA was formed in England in 1928 and became the de-facto world body until the ISRF arrived in 1967, the RAC in London was the unofficial squash authority after forming a squash sub-committee in June 1912 (as shown here). The first meeting was exactly 111 years ago today on 19th June 1912.





In 1981 Bert Armstrong completed building a squash court next to the kitchen in his Melbourne home. This coincided with the first graphite rackets appearing, and so friends left wooden ones behind when he played them – prompting him to hang them round the court. Then he started adding club badges, banners, flags, balls; anything that had a Squash / Racket sports connection. An obsession with collecting was beginning.

As he put it, 'From then on I visited every Charity shop, Municipal Tip, Antique Fair from Hobart Tasmania to Cairns in far North Queensland, and similarly the UK, and even scoured a market in Kirkenes Norway.'

So about 35 years later he has 1000+ rackets from 120 manufacturers in 23 countries plus many badges, books, flags, trophies, documents etc.

When American John Skillman wrote his book 'Squash Racquets' in 1937 he speculated about glass squash courts, over four decades before they began to be produced. Here is the section: [US SQUASH](#)

I often have thought how fine it would be if we could have glass squash courts. At every exhibition match I have watched, even those in which I have played, the spectators were shoving each other and stepping on each other's toes in order to get an occasional glimpse of the players. Some even resorted to getting high step-ladders, so that they might look over the crowd and see a little of the play. This lack of gallery space is indeed a great handicap to the game, for many people who now do not play would want to learn the game if they saw how much real enjoyment players of all degrees of skill get from it. Those who are already interested in the game are anxious to watch good players in action in order to learn things that would better their own games.

Recently I discussed the possibility of building glass courts with a man well acquainted with many glass products on the market today. He thought the idea a good one and quite practical. I have no doubt that within a short time glass courts of the type that I am going to describe will be built. I feel that an investment in courts of this kind would prove profitable to any club interested in increasing interest in squash racquets.

The glass court I have in mind would have its two side walls and its back wall of glass. The inside of the court would be white, and would have the same reaction on the ball as the wood court. There would be no sliding effect, as one might fear. It would be possible for spectators to look in and see all the actions of the players, but the players would not be able to see out. If they could see out the court would be worthless, as the crowd would annoy the players so badly that good squash would be impossible. These glass sides and back could be made every bit as strong as any wood backing. This is hard to believe but it is true. Get ready to play in glass courts in the future and prepare yourself for a great treat.

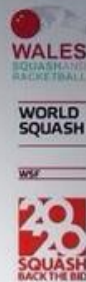

The WSF launched its Ambassador Programme in 2011 with a visit to Riga, Latvia. It was the first of a decade of the WSF international promotional initiative taking leading squash players, together with an international coach and referee, into younger squash nations to help raise the sport's profile - through clinics, exhibition matches, refereeing and coaching seminars, and media presentations. After Latvia the African countries of Malawi and Namibia followed, then Panama and Venezuela in 2013, Papua New Guinea in 2014, before focussing on the Balkan region in 2015 with appearances in Serbia, Romania and Croatia. In 2016, the team visited Dalian and Macau in China. After the 2017 edition was postponed, the Ambassadors went to Armenia and Ukraine in 2018, and Nairobi, Kenya in 2019. 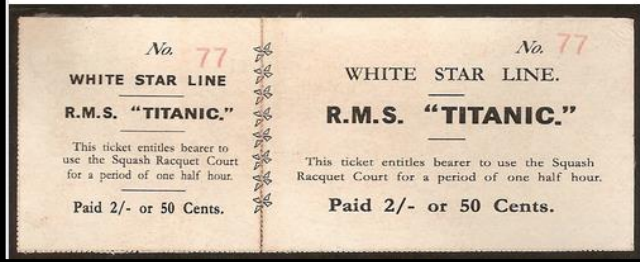

The racket sports reduce the risk of death by 47 per cent compared to doing nothing, researchers discovered based on 11 annual health surveys for England and Scotland from between 1994 and 2008.

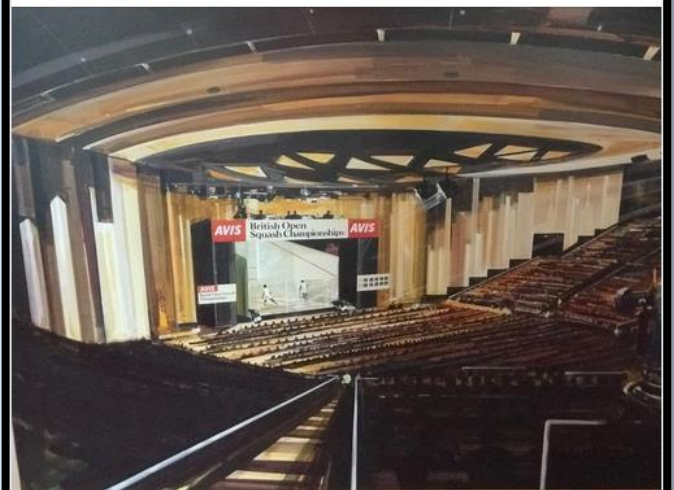

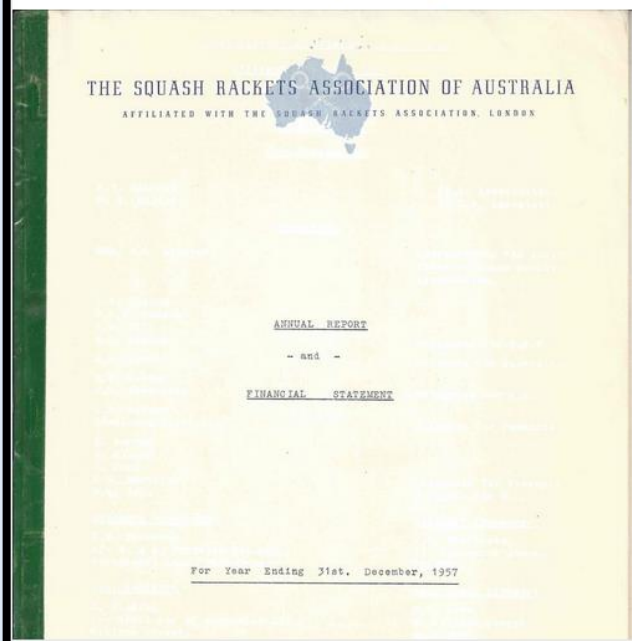

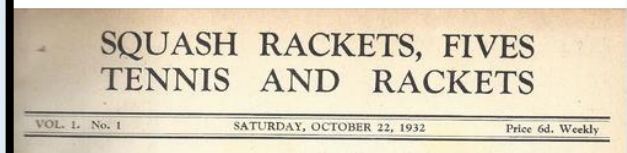

Seventy years ago, in 1951 this report on the state of doubles appeared in a British magazine, indicating that there was only one 'larger' court available. It was a few decades before moveable side wall courts added more on demand to the few permanent ones.

**B**EFORE the war the doubles game was rapidly increasing in popularity and several doubles events were built in the London area. Unfortunately, bombs and other causes have exterminated every doubles court in England, leaving only the doubles court at the Edinburgh Squash Club where devotees of this type of game can continue to play.

In the past few years, there has been growing up an increasing tendency for those who find the singles game too strenuous, to play the doubles game in the ordinary standard singles court. Those who have played the game for some time have evolved the technique by which the players give way to each other so that each player has plenty of room in which to play his shot and collisions between players are surprisingly infrequent.

Although the game is not yet officially recognised by the S.R.A., doubles competitions have started and a tournament has been successfully held at the Worthing Squash Club for the past two seasons.

## WHY NOT HANDICAPS FOR SQUASH?

By PETER HADLEY, Hon. Secretary, The Esports S.R.C.

ALTHOUGH Squash has been growing in popularity from year to year, it has still one great lack; there is no major tournament in which players of all standards can compete with one another on a basis that makes for equality.

In the Lawn Tennis world, thanks to the existence of handicaps, players of an indifferent standard can compete in tournaments with a reasonable chance of surviving several rounds of an event, and perhaps even of winning it. In Squash, on the other hand, the ordinary player has no hope of progressing in a tournament beyond the first or (if he is very

players who never experience anything more exciting after their day's work than an occasional match for their local club, and who would welcome an opportunity for tournament play. The introduction of handicap events would provide such an opportunity.

It should not be difficult to evolve an efficient system of handicapping. Local committees might assign handicaps to members of their own club, based on current form (bolder matches, etc.). Thus the best player in the club might be given a handicap of, say, One 5, and the worst might receive the same amount. These handicaps could be used not only

ment should be able to determine the handicaps with some degree of accuracy. Each competitor could be asked to supply, with his entry, not only information as to his club handicap, but also details of any matches played by him during the season. Most club secretaries keep full records of all matches, so that a member would have no difficulty in obtaining the necessary scores. An enormous number of club matches are played at Squash, and these should provide the handicappers with a great deal of useful information.

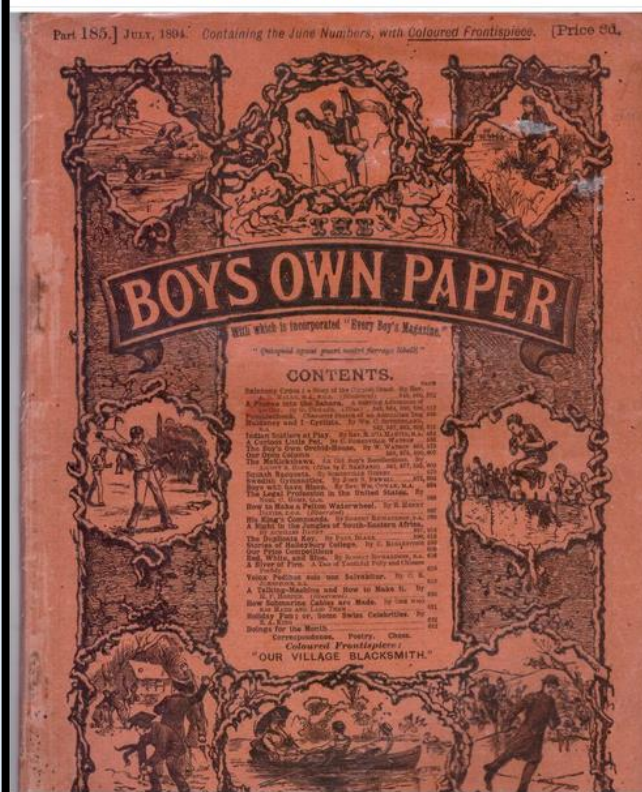

In 1990 the large squash playing business community prompted the English Squash Association to produce a 32 page Filofax Squash Guide, featuring tips, rule details, facts, championship results, useful addresses (and a membership form too!).

The new formal name focused on the key difference to squash – the larger ball, which has a maximum diameter of 57mm (compared with 40mm for a squash ball). 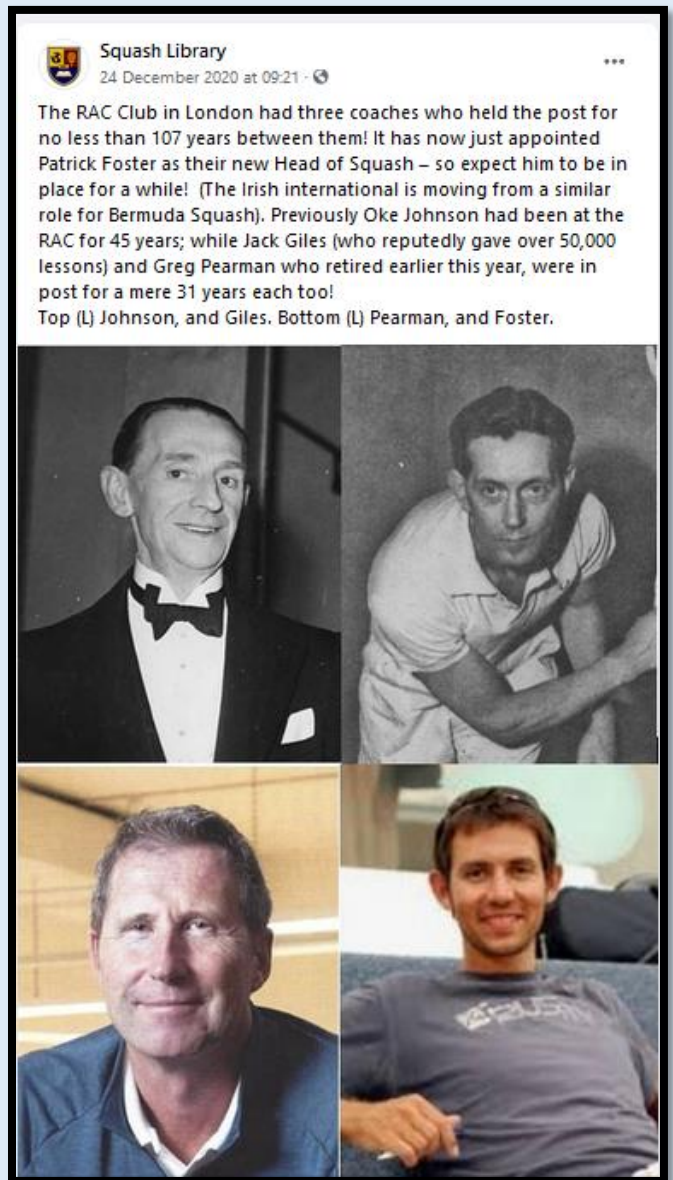

While the SRA in England were still managing the sport internationally (the World Federation began in 1967), they introduced a ball levy so that a proportion of the sales price would come to them as support funding. Hence the ball price rise to 17½p (approx. €0.19½ / \$0.22).

### INCREASE IN PRICE OF THE SQUASH BALL

The increase in the recommended retail price of a squash ball from 3s. to 3s. 6d. from the 1st July, 1965, has come about as the result of a request made by the Squash Rackets Association to the Federation of British Manufacturers of Sports and Games Ltd.

In recent years, the rapid increase of international commitments, in a game in which spectators are necessarily so few, has resulted in a very severe strain on the S.R.A.'s finances, and the repeated, and unsatisfactory recourse to appeals for money from clubs and individuals. The S.R.A. felt that the players in this country would not object to paying an increased price for a ball, if they realised that it was money that was being put back into the game, and was being solely used to maintain our position in international squash, and as the overall governing body. With the game developing so rapidly throughout the world, our S.R.A. is competing with overseas associations, which derive financial assistance from their own sources, and to maintain our leadership in the international federation, which will no doubt shortly come into being, our finances must be on a sounder basis. This levy will, it is hoped, help to do this, and a proportion will go to the Women's S.R.A. to assist them with their international commitments. It must, therefore, be clearly understood, in fairness to the manufacturers and distributors of squash balls in the U.K., that this increase has been made at the request of, and solely for the benefit of, the S.R.A. and W.S.R.A., and is in no way a normal trade increase. The manufacturers are taking no profit whatever from this, and do not at present foresee the need to put up the price further. In view of the fact that the price of the ball has remained stable for so many years, it is hoped that this increase will be accepted without criticism by players in this country, in whose interests it is being made.

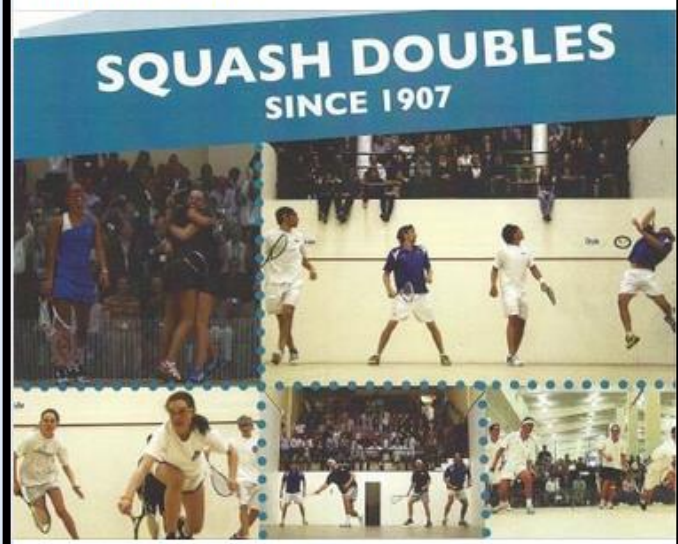

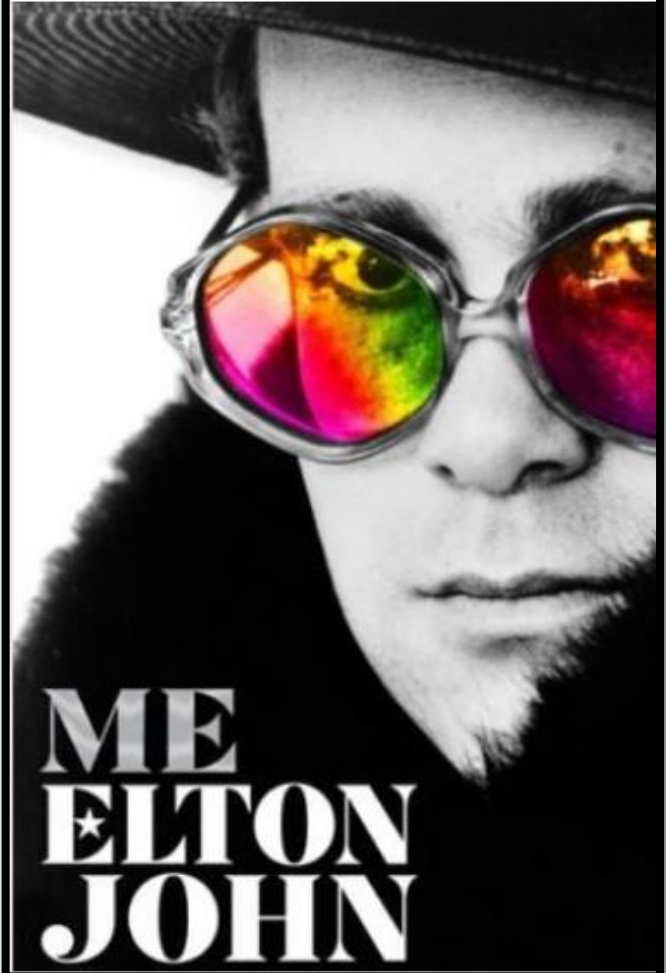

**1974**

The British Open, having been closed to only amateur women since 1922, all enter tournament; the finals are filmed for television by the BBC.

**1976**

The first individual World Championships is played in London in February for Brisbane in August for women; Geoff Hunt and Heather McKay are the winners.

**1977**

Heather McKay wins the last of her record sixteen straight British Open titles.

**1978**

In September six hundred people watch the world's first portable court tournament on a glass back wall erected in the Swedish national tennis centre in Stockholm.

**1979**

In March the first Women's World Team Championships are held in Birmingham.

#### JUMBO DOUBLES – A BIG SOUTH EAST ASIAN IDEA!

Doubles squash can be played on singles courts, and on courts that are expanded to & International Competition width – 7,620 & 8,420mm respectively, as opposed to single 6,400mm. But in South East Asia a variation called Jumbo Doubles is played too on National sized 'Hardball' courts – which are 7,600 wide but much longer than an international as opposed to 9,750mm.



In Thailand in the early 1980s of expatriate tobacco players in Chiang Mai started playing on a singles court at the Club. Soon after the tournament for residents.

Then, during the 1980s Bangkok Sports Club introduced Jumbo Doubles court, using the size of an American hard ball and started a tournament called the Mai Cup.

Called SPIN (Squash Personal Identification Number), it was formulated along the lines of other regulated sports that already had player, coach, official licences. In 1935 an Englishman, Eric Hyde, wrote a book entitled *How to Play Squash Rackets*. In addition to his coaching tips (the illustration shows a rather erect half volley pose), he covers preparation and ladies squash.

On preparing he says this about smoking, '..... none at all on the day of a match, until about half an hour before the match starts, when a cigarette will steady the nerves'. Definitely not a recommendation any more.

He also comments on women's squash saying, 'Usually a woman is quicker and lighter on her feet than a man.... But she is liable to tire quickly with injudicious running about'.

Hyde also explains, '... one other important difference between the sexes in playing games is a temperamental one. Most women play a dashing type of game which produces a brilliant shot one stroke and very often a weak one the next ..... it is definitely not the way to win matches consistently.

The library reports, it does not endorse historical comments!



A FOREHAND HALF-VOLLEY

Do we play squash with a racket or racquet? Generally speaking it has been a racquet in USA, and a racket elsewhere worldwide. In America a 'racket' can be used as a term for unscrupulous activities!

In the late 1300s British author Geoffrey Chaucer used the term racket & later William Shakespeare did too, referring to tennis e.g. King Henry V says 'When we have match'd our rackets to these balls'.

Other famous writers from where the sport originated in UK have used racket, including Johnson, Swift, Thackeray and Dickens.

Perhaps it is best left that either spelling is understood, wherever it is written!





It was in 1978 that one of the first squash computer programmes was developed – by the Victorian Association in Australia. Reacting to the growth of squash and time taken to process results, it was intended to cover areas we have taken for granted for many years now.

At the time the uses were stated to included: (a) weekly match results, (b) Ladders, (c) Performance lists, (d) Registration lists (e) Club registration (f) remote output using data transmission from country areas.

Then, it was claimed that squash was a sport that was an early recogniser of the value of computers to sport.

'HARDBALL. It was noted that the Directors of U.S. SRA voted to recognize and support softball squash as a summer game within the United States, and had recently completed the first national softball championships'. World Squash Day was born in the aftermath of the 11 September 2001 World Trade Centre attack in New York. Former Scottish squash junior international Derek Sword was one of the many fatalities, and WSD founder Alan Thatcher along with Sword's friend Laurie Maclachlan decided this would be a fitting tribute, while doing something positive for the sport.

A few months later on 11 January 2002 the inaugural event was an eight player challenge tournament at Lambs Club in London, including stars Peter Nicol, John White and Paul Price (logos 2002 – 2004 below).

The occasion also marked the first 15 a side London-New York Challenge match for the Derek Sword Trophy donated by Derek's friends and colleagues at Keefe Bruyette Woods in New York.

With more than 50 events taking place around the world in 20 different countries, it was the start of the annual worldwide Day used to develop and promote squash.

In keeping with the Library archive role, as it is April Fools Day here is an article on postal squash from The English Federation magazine 27 years ago, just before the internet began. (Mea culpa!). Now time for a new version? Web Squash?

## My three wall boast got lost in the post

"SURELY he can't have volleyed," I thought as I retrieved the familiar looking postcard that had come to rest, snuggled neatly between the final gas demand and a card from the library insisting that three books had been required back many moons ago. Ignoring the ever-mounting library fine, I turned over Peter's card to find that he had indeed played a sharp volley deep into the forehand court.

Here we were well into the fifth game of our Postal Squash match and he was still taking the ball early. One could only marvel at the stamina of an opponent after eight months' exhausting play. Still, a good response now and my trump card - a same-day couriered card no less - would see me at match ball.

You may not have encountered Postal Squash since there are currently only two players, but stand by for what may become the new sporting phenomenon of the 1990s. Don't be surprised if it sounds the death knell for scores of squash clubs, as participants switch from the frantic energy sapping version they currently play in the sweat boxes of the nation.

What is postal squash? Quite simply, it is a derivation of postal chess in which each player sends his opponent the next shot in a rally which continues until a point is won.

I cannot yet reveal the rules and general details of postal squash, as my patent application has yet to be granted. Obviously I must wait until I can do so without fear that it might be copied before royalties can be agreed. However, I am conceited enough to believe that I might be doing for the development of sport what Mr. Waddington has done for board games. And I'm not overly worried about the reaction from those who say the whole element of exercise has gone. I can simply point to the virtual elimination of any risk of injury, which must surely be to everybody's benefit.

I am prepared to say that in principle a player wins a point if the opponent incorrectly anticipates a shot when cards cross in the post. Or when his return doesn't arrive within a stipulated deadline. Of course, the requirement for quick delivery if points are not to be squandered generally means short matches in England where the Post Office continue to mount strikes or simply lose letters within their sorting system for days and weeks! It is only a personal observation, but mail is definitely more likely to go astray if it has a short distance to travel. Address it to the other side of the country and it will unerringly arrive the next day if it has been sent second class and three days later if posted first class, but don't hold out too much hope if you are corresponding within the same town!

But I digress. Readers will appreciate that postal squash cannot operate effectively without use of a third party who will receive and log all shots. It is he or she who adjudicates on lets and strokes, ensures players do not take more than the one week break allowed between games, and

## COULD YOU PLAY FOR IRELAND?

The Irish S.R.A. is trying to form a panel of British based players who are eligible to play for Ireland. Ireland has been the weakest of the four home countries for many years and the Association feels that there are many good players who live and play their squash in England who do not realise that they are qualified to play for Ireland. The differences between the county and international qualifications are that whereas the residential qualification for international teams is three years instead of one, an international qualification may be obtained if a player's father was born in the country. Therefore any first-class player whose father had been born in either Eire or Northern Ireland is qualified to play for Ireland and the Irish S.R.A., the Fitzwilliam Lawn Tennis Club, Wilton Place, Dublin 2, would like to hear from him.

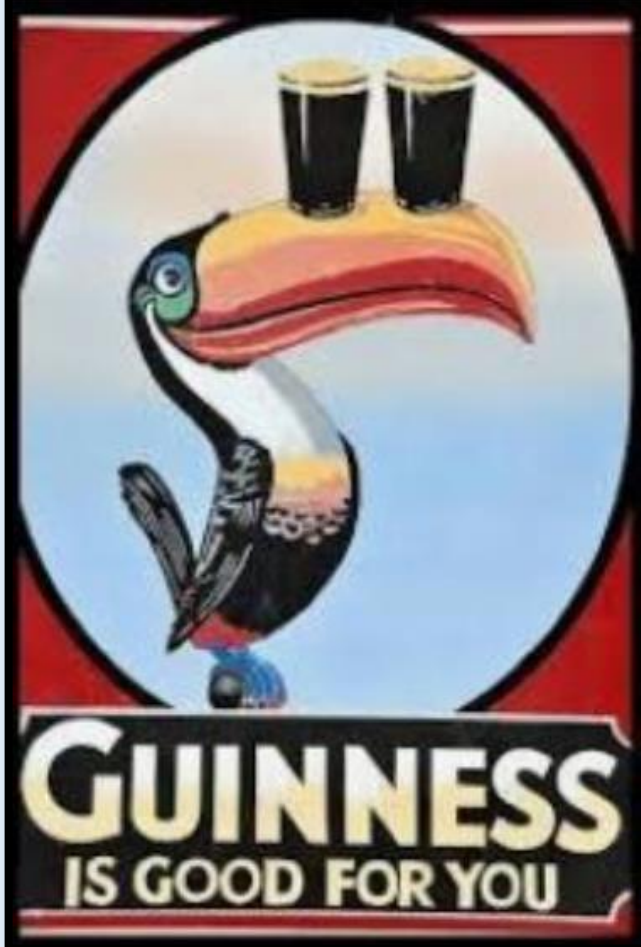
Such were the number of seventies UK players that in 1977 a company produced a Squash Player's Diary that ran for several years. In addition to normal diary detail, it featured a grid for match bookings and results and sections on Rules, tactics and refereeing. (Oh, and the obligatory London Underground map too!)



In 1987 research carried out for a London, England commercial radio station, Capital Radio, come up with the impressive stat that 1 in every 20 men aged 15 to 34 from London played squash at weekends. When all ages were combined the proportion dropped to 1 in 50 – which still placed squash as twice as popular as golf, and on a level with tennis.



As far back as the 1920's Guinness advertised their beer as having health benefits. They also must have thought the same about squash as they had a squash court at their London brewery, as did another famous brand, Watneys. After WW2 they and some of the other London firms started the London Breweries Squash League which ran into the 1950s. Supporters no doubt hoped to be invited to the post-match socialising! ## DID SHAKESPEARE PLAY SQUASH RACKETS AND FIVES?

By W. HODGSON BURNET

YOU will, of course, at once pooh-pooh the idea that Shakespeare ever played either Squash Rackets or Fives. But I am not so sure. In fact from a close study of his works I have at least convinced myself that not only was he a keen player of both games but that he belonged to a recognised club—which had international fixtures. In Henry V. i. 2, he says—  
"When we have matched our rackets to these balls we will in France by God's grace play a set."  
(The difficulty he mentions of being able to get "rackets to match these balls" is one which luckily no reader of this paper who patronises our advertisers need have to face). That Shakespeare knew something about the design and construction of Squash courts there can be little doubt. Playing a match one day he remarks to his opponent—  
"The roof of this court is too high."  
(Love's Labour's Lost ii. 1)  
and again, speaking of a friend who had just built one with out expert advice, he says—  
"He hath a court he little cares for."  
(Cymbeline i. 7)  
Sometimes (for he was only human) Shakespeare appears to have lost his temper when playing, for we find him exclaiming angrily—  
"That's a foul fault!" (Henry V. iii. 2)  
but after a hard won match he shows his real love of the game by saying in a sort of ecstasy—  
"This Squash—!" (Winter's Tale i. 2).

With regard to Fives there is distinct evidence (always of course cunningly concealed in the text) that Shakespeare had a marked preference for the Rugby game, for when asked to make up a four he says with enthusiasm—  
"Rugby! Come to the Court!" (Merry Wives i. 4)  
muttering as he goes in evident disparagement of the Eton game—  
"No jatty—bustren!" (Macbeth i. 6)  
I am sorry to say that in the matter of Fives gloves Shakespeare shows himself a bit of a snob for he refers (quite unaccountably) to—  
"Those gloves the Court gave me." (Much Ado About Nothing iii. 4)  
I am still sorer to have to record that the Bard was addicted to the practice (referred to in a recent issue of this paper) of inserting pieces of metal in his gloves for apparently just before a match he says in a spirit of pure swank—  
"Fill this glove with crowns." (Henry V. iii. 8)  
then turning to his opponent adds in a confident and offensive manner—  
"I dare you to this match." (Cymbeline i. 2)  
I could give any number of further references to prove that the question in the title of this article must be answered in the affirmative. Want of space however forbids—  
[So do I. Definitely.—Ed.]

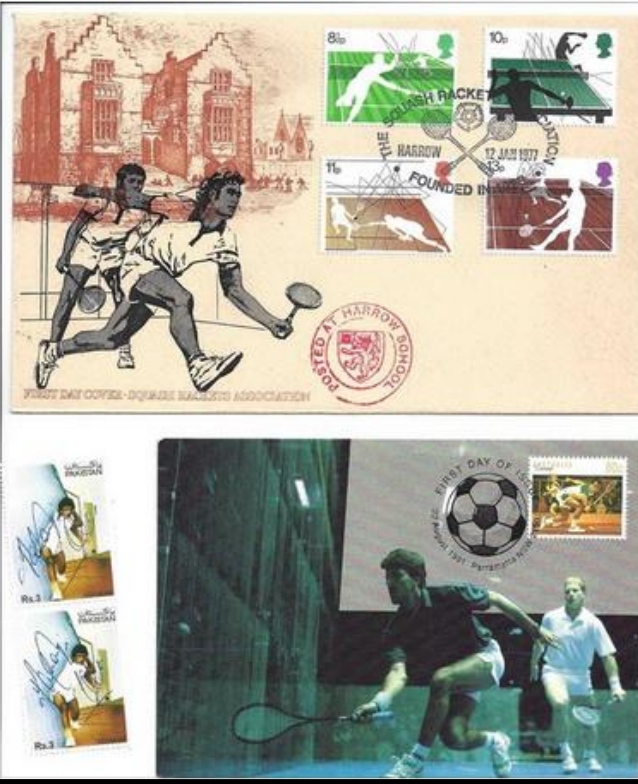

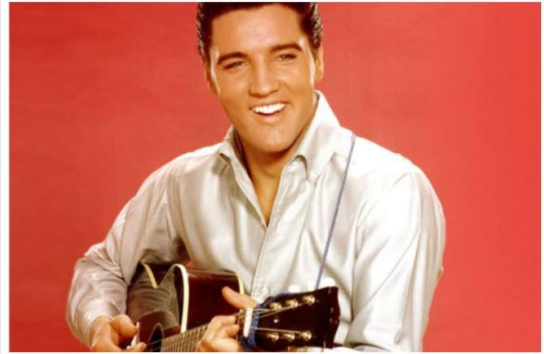

# THE REST IS HISTORY

Mike Dale finds out about the World Squash Library. Andrew Shelley's new labour of love following his departure from the World Squash Federation

In a small room recently vacated by an osteopath at Southgate Squash Club in North London lies a treasure trove of 4,000 items revealing every significant event in the world of squash dating back to 1890.

The room - packed full of books, magazines, photos, tournament programmes, annuals, handbooks and much else besides - is the recently-launched passion of Andrew Shelley, who finally has sufficient time and dedication to invest in it since leaving his post as CEO of the World Squash Federation in June.

Called the World Squash Library, it is undoubtedly the most comprehensive collection of squash information on the planet. It includes almost every book ever written about the game (nearly 200 in total), as well as every single issue of Squash Player magazine since it first hit newsstands in 1971 (as well as back issues of many 'live' magazines, which are, alas, now extinct).

"I've started this library to ensure we preserve the history of squash for future generations, as well as helping the current generation - media, fans, players, national federations, students - who need information now," Shelley told Squash Player. "This is a collection which is ever-growing and will never be complete."

The library is not open to the public as such, but visitors are welcome by appointment. You can browse what Shelley believes is the first book ever written specifically about the game - The Game of Squash by Eustace Miles, published in 1900, as well as a compendium Sports & Pastimes, which dates back to 1890. There is also a copy of The Boy's Own Paper from 1894 with an article on squash.

It isn't Shelley's intention to make money from the project, only to, he says, "give back to the sport that has given me so much over these last 40-odd years".

His plan is to fund-raise in order to provide greater services to those seeking historical information. He has catalogued all the materials and intends to digitise key data, so that it is more easily searchable, starting with historical world individual and team events, and British Opens.

He has already begun posting daily fascinating insights from documents and photos from the collection on the World Squash Library website Facebook and Twitter feeds. Further articles and posters will be made available looking back at advertising, court development and other facets of the sport.

"There's so much that can be done to provide colour to the fabric of squash," he explains. "It's not intended as a commercial

proposition; it's to provide a service now and into the future. Over time, my task will get easier and thereafter I can be more activity-driven.

"I'm not being paid to run the library and clearly it can only be very helpful to a small number of people. I'm only one pair of hands, but I'll be doing this until I drop, so hopefully I'll have plenty of time to make it pretty special."

Shelley has been hoarding squash memorabilia ever since his first job in the sport some 42 years ago - and it was this very magazine that helped kick-start his career-long love affair with squash.

In 1976 Shelley was working as a publicity assistant for Rolex, which had sponsored the British Amateur Closed Championships. He bought a copy of Squash Player magazine to check it a Rolex advertisement it had supplied had been published. Inside, he spotted a job advertisement for a tournament and affiliation secretary at the Squash Racquets Association (now England Squash). He applied, got the job, stayed at the organisation for 18 years and never left the squash industry for the rest of his working life.

After the SRA, he spent 15 years at WSPA (later the WSA, before it joined forces with the PSA) and is credited with growing the women's professional tour by 300 per cent. He joined the World Squash Federation in 2010 and spent nine years as its chief executive.

He reflected: "Having seen out the last Olympic bid - together with the PSA, we mounted a terrific bid - it was clear we were miles away from the current intentions of the IOC (International Olympic Committee), so I thought it was time for somebody fresh to come in."

"I'm now throwing myself into growing the library, but in financial terms I'm now unemployed, at least until the male modelling assignments start rolling in! I'm sure it's only a matter of time!"

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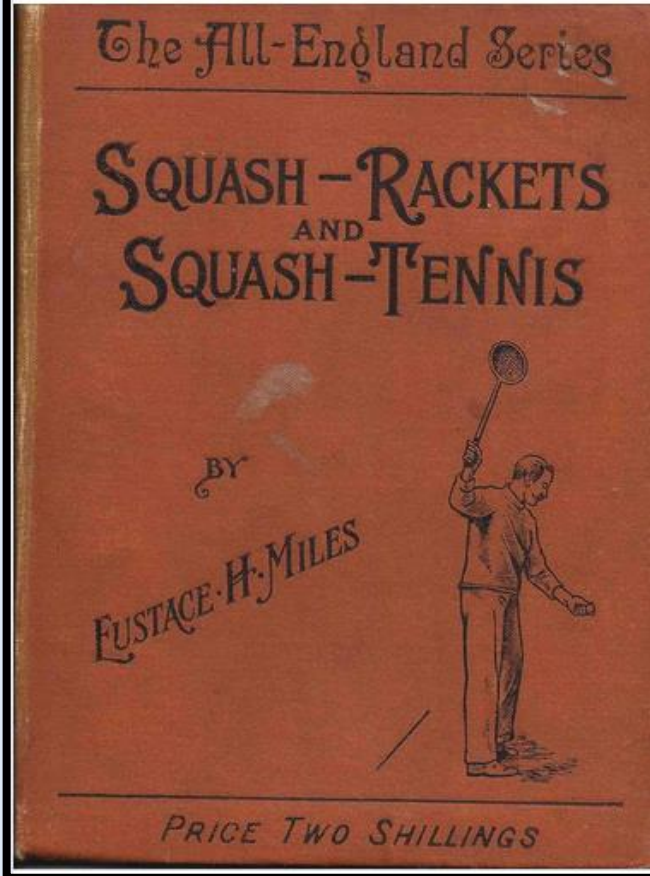

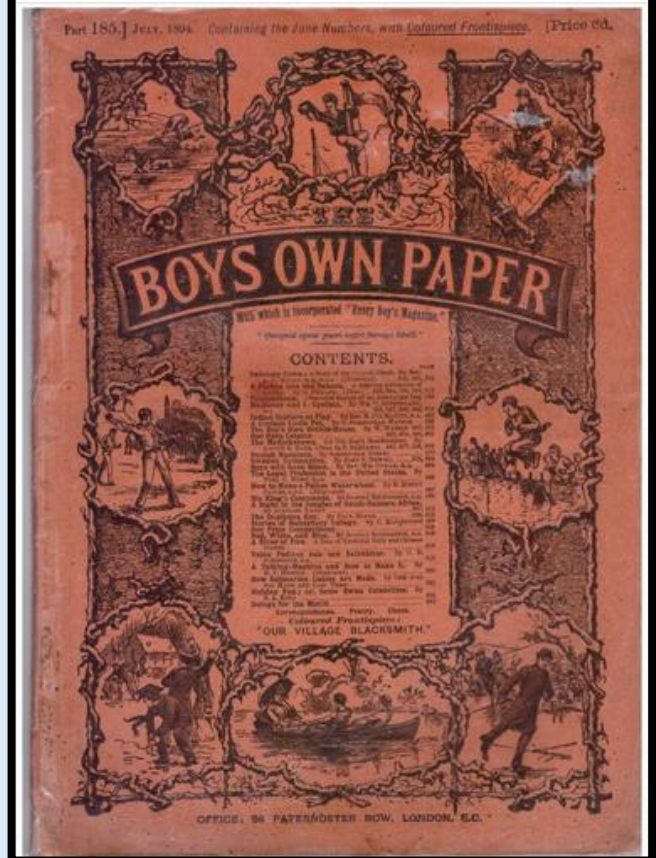




Eustace Miles, the Amateur Champion of America of Rackets and also Squash-Tennis (as he called it), and Amateur Champion of the World of the time, wrote *The Game of Squash*, first published in 1900. He said 'Squash has no literature of its own: I believe that this is the first book on the game. In fact, till 1899 I had never seen an article on squash, or even a report of a match'. (Miles clearly had not seen the magazine article on squash in *Boy's Own Paper* of 1894 – see yesterday's posting!). [US SQUASH](#)

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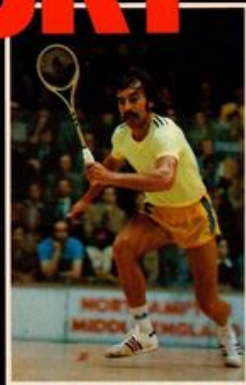
